## Conkling Proclaims his Purpose.

Glutted with the pride of a victory achieved in the New York election, Senator Conkling has since that event proclaimed the binding condition for his party next year—that it shall be awarded only to one whom he will approve. This is not the letter, but it is the spirit of the announcement. The condition effectually wipes the names of John Sherman and Sen. Blaine from the list, notwithstanding he compelled the first and permitted the last to engage in the canvass in favor of Cornell. It is, in fact, as if he brought them to the task of digging their own political graves in order to supply himself with the earth to higher raise his own partisan mound. Conkling is now, nearer than any other, the master of the Radical situation. No candidate can be nominated in the National Convention unless with his consent and vote. Chandler's death has left him sole autocrat of the party in the Senate, and he will make Hayes and John Sherman feel his remorseless might and main. They cannot foil him or spoil his plans; nor can Blaine; while he can and unquestionably will frustrate the designs of each and all of them. Conkling champions Grant and will groom him for the race so as to shut all others out.

## Greenbacks.

Chairman Wood, who is chairman of the committee of ways and means, takes a very honest view of the greenback question. He says that he voted against their original issue, but now that they have been issued, they are a part of our currency. The increase in the volume of the currency, by virtue of the importation of European gold has not operated as inflation; though a volume of \$750,000,000 would have been too much in 1875 it is not enough in 1879. So great have been the growth of the our business interests in the mean time. The trouble with the president and secretary is that they fail to understand that trade has outgrown the old shackles in which it was formerly conducted. The greenbacks came into existence as a war measure. They speedily proved their usefulness. There is no good reason why they should be abolished. The people look with suspicion upon them. They fail to see why there should be such a clamor raised against them, unless there be an ulterior design lying in the crusade. One such scheme has already been sprung upon the people in the demonetization of silver. The nation will not tamely submit to another such performance.

## An Opinion on Grant's Candidacy.

The Arizona Miner publishes a letter written by Hon. Zachariah Chandler, a short time before his death addressed to an official in that Territory, in which the following sentences occur: "I am under impression now that Grant's chances for the Presidential nomination are better than those of any other person; but unless he is nominated without a contest he will be out of the field, and there will be a trial of strength between the friends and supporters of a few stalwart Radicals. No unknown man of lukewarm sentiments or obscure antecedents will be nominated. \* \* I know nothing special in regard to the matter, only that if General Grant is a candidate no one else will be." Few politicians are more thoroughly versed concerning Republican sentiment on this subject in the East than was Mr. Chandler.

## Registration Frauds in Philadelphia.

Referring to the political situation and to the means by which the Radicals carry Pennsylvania, L. Q. Washington writes to the New Orleans Picayune to this effect: The Republicans have never been more desperate in their lust for power than now. Their leaders, or many of them, hate and despise Grant; but they take him because they deem him their strongest man. They are ready for any amount of fraud and crime in order to keep power. The corruptions and frauds by which they are barely saved a Republican Legislature in Maine are being exposed, and are making such a sensation as alarms the Radical managers. Take Philadelphia. In 1870 Philadelphia had a population of 574,022. New York had 942,202. Both cities have increased in population, but New York more rapidly than Philadelphia. In New York, which is not under Republican rule, the registration stood the other day, at 168,143. There was a large registration, because everybody was interested in the result. In Philadelphia, where there was very little political excitement, the registration is 193,693, being 25,497 more voters than New York. At least 40,000 or 50,000 of these votes in Philadelphia are fraudulent. No wonder the Republicans are able to roll up 25,000 or 30,000 majority so as to overcome the interior. With such gigantic hands as these it seems needless to expect the vote of Pennsylvania for Hancock or any other Democratic candidate. The Republican managers are so well satisfied with this arrangement for fraud in Philadelphia that they do not want any United States Deputy Marshals appointed even of their own party. This grand fraud is perpetrated year by year, and has been kept up twice as long as Tweed's frauds in New York, by a set of scoundrels who wear broadcloth and figure on 'Change, churches and subscription lists.

## Important Bills.

Senator Slater introduced in the Senate on the 18th, a bill providing for an allowance of a drawback of custom house duties on tin used in the manufacture of cans which are exported from the United States filled with salmon, fruit, vegetables, etc. This drawback, which is now provided by law in many similar matters, would amount to \$40,000 per year upon tin cans used for the exportation of Columbia river salmon. This is an important measure to Oregon and Washington Territory, and we trust it will become a law.

Senator Booth has introduced a bill providing that where settlers enter upon lands supposed to be public, and subsequently fails to acquire title, the fee and commissions they have paid in good faith shall be refunded to them. Such a law would be in the interest of simple justice and fair dealing. Why does Government retain the money of poor men when nothing is given in return? The same bill passed both houses last winter, but, strange to state, failed to receive the President's signature. It should be the duty of the national land agents to know, so far as possible, precisely what tracts can be acquired by the general public. Much loss and litigation would thus be avoided. Too many of them are not sufficiently in sympathy with the actual settlers.

## A Slight Mistake.

When the arrears of pensions bill was passed, Secretary Sherman raised a howl that it would create a deficiency of \$27,000,000 and wanted the tax restored on tea and coffee to meet this extraordinary drain on the public treasury. Congress paid no attention to Sherman's demand, and made the appropriations to pay the pensions against his protests. In his annual report the secretary shows that there is a surplus of \$7,000,000 in the treasury. This is only a difference of 34,000,000 in Sherman's calculations. But then he didn't take into account the revival of business to be brought about by the demonetization of silver.

The Atlanta Constitution says Horatio Seymour is a New York man, who, it is suspected, could carry his own State.

The Levee Herald says that Goose lake is frozen over, and skating parties are numerous. The ice on the slough is reported strong enough to bear up a team and load.

## A Startling Proposition.

Representative Weaver, of Iowa, National, has introduced a Bill in Congress to put the soldiers and sailors who served in the civil war on a footing with the bondholders in respect to pay, so as to make good to them the difference there was at the time between the face and current value of the Greenbacks which they received for their services, with six per cent from the date of payment. The Bill contemplates a total appropriation of about five hundred millions of dollars.

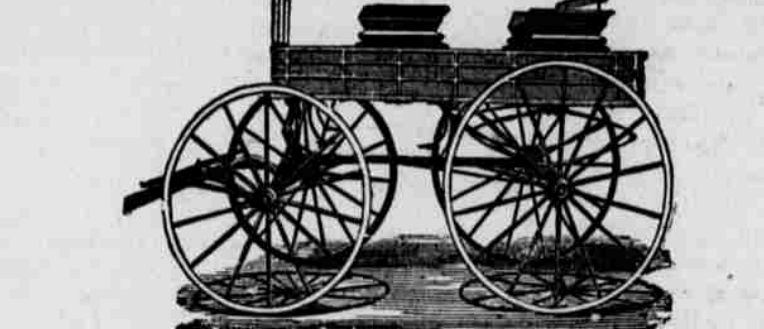
