Oregon's Delegation,

The Standard's lively correspondent, Mr. T A Sutherland, writes from Washington as follows, concerning Oregon's delegation in

It is pleasant to be able to say that the Oregonian delegation is working in entire harmony and unison, and on all the questions vital are of one opinion. Scuator Slater is personally looking after the Portland Board of Trade's request for a rebate on the duty on tin, and juforms me that he anticipates but little trouble in accomplishing it. The Northern Pacific Railroad engages a great deal of Senator Grover's time and attention and he will do what he can to have the road built down the south bank of the Columbia river to Portland. Notwithstanding the resolution passed by the executive committee of the 7th of December, 1877, that the company was "willing to construct its road on the south side of the Columbia river to Portland" there has been a disposition on the part of the managers to ferget this -a principal reason for which is that they get more land by running their line through a territory than a state. He informs me that he had quite a long talk with some of the N P R R directors and succeeded in convincing them that their only true terminus is at Pertland, the metropolis of the Northwestern Coast, and there, as, lawyers say, we will ever pray it may be located. Governor Whiteaker is busy with a report

on a bill referred to him as a sub committee in which he takes the very sensible ground that the Indian reservations should be less in number, making the cost less to the government and their surveillance simple, on the theory that the fewer the agents and em ployees the easier it is to watch them and the more concentrated the Indians the easier to keep them in control. This naturally would throw several rich agencies open to settlement and it is a thing earnestly hoped for, I believe, by many people in Oregon. To prevent land speculators from appropriating these new lands the Governor has made some very wise provisions in favor of bona fide settlers, and should the bill be adopted by the committee and approved by the House it will result in much good to the entire country west of the Mississippi and to the goverument itself. Flattering myself that I know something about Indian affairs, I look upon this report of Congressman Whiteaker's as one of of the most intelligent strokes yet made in the direction of the Indian problem solution. First catch your hare, as the cosk books say, and so Governor Whiteaker says first get your siwashes together before you begin to talk about civilizing them. So long as they are scattered and nomadic, all the laws and all the peace policy rubbish in forty worlds will accomplish nothing.
