Democratic State Convention.

A Democratic State Convention is hereby called to meet at Albany, on Wednesday, April 7, at 1 o'clock P. M., for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Congress, three candidates for Supreme Judges, Judges for each of the several judicial districts and Prosecutors, Attorneys, and the election of six delegates to attend the National Democratic Convention, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the Convention. The Convention will consist of 169 delegates, apportioned among the various counties as follows:

## THE ADDRESS.

The promised address to the Democracy from the committee appointed by the State Central Committee, has been prepared, and we present it in full, on another page, to our readers. We bespeak for it a careful consideration on their part.

Special attention is called to that portion of the address in which the relation of State and National power is discussed. The tendency in all latter legislation has been to weaken State authority, and supplant it by the strong arm of the central power. The dangers that menace, and finally subverted former republics, are possible with us. Let it once be established that a State must be subservient to National policy in controlling her domestic affairs, existing and tolerated by the sufferance of a centralized head, the great principles of the Union are destroyed, and over ridden as completely as if the lost cause had succeeded. The Democratic party has ever pledged itself to the maintenance of the rights guaranteed the States by our constitution. It recognizes the National Government, but would seek to confine its exercise within the constitutional limitations prescribed by the great charter of our rights; it must remain the servant, not the master of the States.

The appeal for unity in party councils should be heeded. Upon the eve of an important Presidential election Democrats should forget the petty jealousies begotten by cliques and rings, and strive for the success of principles dear to every lover of our Republican institutions. Heed not those divisions engendered by personal preferences and faction, which the common enemy would fan into a flame for our own destruction. Attend your conventions, especially primaries, and select men for your representatives, who have the interests of the party at heart. The schemes of ambitious politicians for their own profit and aggrandizement concern not the solid mass of Democratic voters, and should be severely rebuked. Let the rank and file labor harmoniously for the principles held sacred by the grand old Democratic party and success is assured. With a united front victory is certain.

## Chinese Emigration.

The House committee on education and labor have agreed to report a bill for the prohibition of Chinese emigration, substantially the same as that passed by Congress last winter, but vetoed by President Hayes. It restricts the number that can be landed by any one vessel to fifteen, and omits the sections requiring notice to be given of the abrogation of sections fifth and sixth of the Burlingame treaty—these being the sections upon which the President mainly based his veto.

**PUBLIC DEBT STATEMENT.**—Uncle Sam is in a bad condition financially. From the Public Debt Statement Dec. 31st, 1879, we learn that the interest bearing debt is \$1,780,086,850. Debt bearing no interest, \$407,403,095.04. Interest unpaid, \$24,691,933.75. Total debt, \$2,210,782,408.79. Total cash in Treasury, \$207,983,903.92. Debt less cash on hand, \$2,011,798,504.87.

## Tilden's Position.

The New York correspondent of the Philadelphia Ledger writes as follows: Mr. Kelly, it is understood is willing at any moment for the sake of peace to resign his position as Tammany leader, in order to bring that organization into accord with the rest of the party, provided Governor Tilden will give some authoritative assurance that he is not again a candidate for the Presidency. It may be emphatically reported here what has already been stated, that Mr. Tilden will not, under any circumstances, comply with that condition. His response to all such overtures is substantially this: "I have nothing to do with John Kelly or Tammany Hall, and I must peremptorily decline to enter into any negotiations on their behalf. My cause is the cause of the people of the United States, and, as that cause ought in justice and equity to be tried over again at the polls, it is not for any local politician or for any local faction, meanwhile, to stand in the way, of the Democracy of the nation carrying their appeal from the findings of the Electoral Commission to the ballot-box." Every Congressman who has approached Mr. Tilden on the subject will testify to the correctness of this representation of his position, and its importance as showing that the re-union of the party in New York is apparently hopeless, as things stand at present, is not to be over estimated.

## Must Have New York.

The recent drift of the tide in New Jersey and Connecticut has been toward the Republicans, but it will be perceived that New York and Indiana cast 50 votes, and if the Democrats can add these to the 138 Southern votes, he will have 188, which is three more than a majority. But it will be seen also that Indiana, New Jersey and Connecticut cast only 28 votes, which is 19 short of the number which the Democratic candidate must have from the North in order to succeed. Therefore it is that the Democrats cannot get along without the vote of New York. The case is just as clear with the Republicans. The whole number of Electoral votes in the North is 231. Take away the 50 votes of New York and Indiana, and the remainder is 181, which is four short of a majority.

## Long May It Prosper.

The Daily Examiner, that reliable exponent of Democratic principles, has entered upon the fifteenth year of its existence and thirtieth volume. No Democratic journal on this Coast can compare with it for ability in editorial management. Bold and fearless in its statements, it challenges admiration of its opponents. Long may it live and prosper in the good work.

The grand total of American exports for the year ending June 30th, 1879, was seven hundred and seventeen million (\$717,093,777); of imports, four hundred and sixty-six million (\$466,973,775.) showing a balance in our favor of exports over imports of two hundred and fifty-one million (\$251,020,001). Only twenty three per cent. of this vast trade was carried in American bottoms. In 1860, more than seventy per cent. of our foreign trade was carried in American bottoms.

SENATOR THURMAN, the Washington Star states, does not seem to take his enforced retirement from politics much to heart. The other day, in the Senate Chamber, a friend complimented him upon the receipt of a handsome bouquet that ornaments his desk. "Oh, yes," replied the Senator, "some kind friends have sent these to decorate my political coffin."

The New York Nation hopes it will not be accused of pessimism in saying that "the Administration's part in the New York canvass destroys all hope of any further gain from it to the cause of civil service reform."

The Republican party, a cotemporary alleges, has not only outlived its usefulness, but it has outlived its manliness. "Its whole capital is in tombstones." Like the potato-crop its best part is under ground.

According to the almanac there will be six eclipses next year. The Doylestown Mirror reckons on one more—the eclipse of the Republican Presidential candidates. Exit Grant!

## A Remarkable Declaration.

In a recent leading article the New York Tribune made this statement as to itself: "The action of the Louisiana Returning Board has always been denounced by this paper as one of the greatest crimes of the country." This declaration augments rather than palliates the gross misconduct of the Tribune, in view of the fact that, notwithstanding it pretends to set its face against corruption and the resort to force and fraud in election matters, it unqualifiedly sustains Hayes' usurpation of executive authority, and vindicates the appointment of the villains of the Florida and Louisiana returning boards to high and rich offices. The Tribune cannot be blind to its position. To denounce the action of the Louisiana returning board as a crime is virtually to admit that Tilden was elected. To admit this and still support the title of Hayes to the office is a discreditable dilemma in which no honest journal or honorable citizen will become involved.

The Chicago Times says: The President is greatly distressed about the non-enforcement in the Territory of Utah of the law against polygamy. And yet none is to blame, but himself. It is the President's duty to take care that the laws shall be faithfully executed.

It seems to be universally conceded remarks the Manchester Union, that with Horatio Seymour as the Presidential candidate, a Democratic victory next year is absolutely certain. We have yet to learn that any man, Democrat or Republican, has seriously, expressed a different opinion.

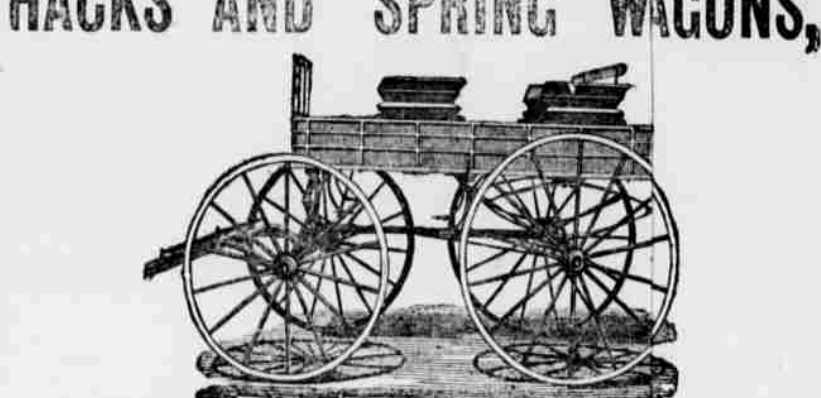
