Democratic County Convention.

At a meeting of the Democratic County Committee, held at Eugene City, Feb. 20, 1880, it was ordered that the Democratic County Convention be held at Eugene City, on Saturday, the 27th day of March, 1880, for the purpose of selecting 10 delegates to the State Convention, to be held at Albany, April 7th; also of nominating a candidate for State Senator, 3 candidates for Representatives, 2 candidates for County Commissioners, a candidate for County Judge, Sheriff, Clerk, Treasurer, Assessor, School Superintendent, Surveyor and Coroner. It was also recommended that the precinct conventions be held at the respective places of voting on Saturday, March 20th. The County Convention will consist of 55 delegates, apportioned one for each precinct and one for every 25 votes or fraction thereof of 15 or over, east for State Senator at the June election, 1878, as follows: South Eugene, 7; Pleasant Hill, 3; North Eugene, 5; Siuslaw, 3; Camp Creek, 1; Lancaster, 6; Springfield, 4; Lost Valley, 2; Willamette, 3; Long Tom, 2; Cottage Grove, 4; Hazel Dell, 1; Coast Fork, 3; Fall Creek, 1; Mohawk, 2; Middle Fork, 1; Spencer, 2; McKenzie, 1; Richardson, 4. Total, 55. J. M. THOMPSON, Chairman.

Committee Meeting.

The Republican State Central Committee met at Salem, Wednesday, Feb. 18th, and issued a call for the State convention to meet at Portland, April 21st, 1880. The committee recommend that primaries be held April 3d, and county conventions April 10th.

Twenty counties were represented in the committee and eleven of these were represented by proxy. Federal and State officer holders, child-like and bland, such as W. H. Odell, Jas. Egan, R. P. Earhart, J. C. McCort, Sol Hirsch and E. P. Falleroach, predominating, by the aid of these desirable proxies. Some one of the committee seemed to have an inkling that the proxy business might be carried to an extreme in the State Convention, as well as the committee meeting, and moved the number to any one person be limited to one. The "bosses," however, failed to take a favorable view of a motion that would so far reduce their power, and the resolution was lost.

Strong Candidate.

Among the many probable candidates for the Presidency, named by the Democrats we find that of Hon. Stephen J. Field. Should it be the will of the convention to give us this sterling, state right Democrat, as our standard bearer, we can assure Democrats of the East that no one is so certain to carry this coast as he. Out here we are not only true to the faith of the "fathers," but we would roll up such majorities for "our own" as would astound the natives. Give us Field and we assure you we will give you this entire coast. No other man can certainly get these electoral votes.

ANTI-GRANT Republicans have arrived at that point where they are willing to accept a strong Grant advocate, instead of the dictator himself.
