These pieces are then thoroughly mixed, replaced in the box without regard to numbers, and then trouble begins. The purpose of the game is, by moving the pieces around, taking advantage of the one vacant square, to bring them in the same order as above. It will be found easy enough to bring all but the last line into position, but to bring 13, 14 and 15 into position is the puzzle which is driving so many into their early graves. 
