DEMOCRATIC STATE TICKET.

The Democratic State Convention has performed its mission and its selections now stand before the people. They are all good men and were selected for their fitness and ability to fulfill faithfully the duties incumbent on the various stations. Having just returned from the convention, and for lack of time and space we forbear further comment at present.

A Very Considerable Reduction.

One of the considerations, not in writing but sufficiently understood between the "high contracting parties," aside from the appointment of Naval Officer at New Orleans for which the old villain, J. M. Wells, of the Louisiana Returning Board counted out Mr. Tilden and counted in Hayes, was the payment of his claim against the Government for losses of cotton, buildings, horses and other property, destroyed during the war by the Union troops in Louisiana, amounting to \$460,558. The House Committee on War Claims have given the claim of Mr. Hayes' dear friend and confederate in the great fraud a very careful examination and find the actual sum to which he has any shadow of claim, in justice, exactly \$3,525, or just \$447, 133 less than the old villain claims. As Hayes and John Sherman and Grant's "visiting statesmen" are under promise to pay the claim, they can probably arrange for this small balance of something below a half-million. Hayes might appropriate the amount he has already taken of the salary which honestly belongs to Mr. Tilden, and John Sherman would find no difficulty in stealing his proportion from the Treasury. What they will do to appease the old villain remains to be developed.

The Atlanta Constitution says: The Independent Republicans, as well as the Republicans who oppose imperialism, will discover that the only real opposition to the Republican machine and to Caesarism is centered in the Democratic party. A nod is as good as a wink to a horse with the blind staggers.

It is said that Mexico will soon hold an election and postmasters, telegraph operators, army officers and civil functionaries are commanded not to interfere. The people are to have perfect freedom at the polls. Americans will now cease prating about anarchy and chicanery in the Mexican Republic, referring to her as a horrible example of misgovernment—at least until they can clear their own skirts of the imputation; for, if there is anything the "free" people of the United States are denied, it is immunity from the officious interference of Federal officials and the army of deputy marshals the packed U S Supreme Court has decided should be maintained at the polls.

IT HAD VERY LITTLE WAY TO GO.—"Brick" Pomeroy's Democrat, at La Crosse, Wisconsin, has been sold to Alexander Nevins, who will make it a Republican evening newspaper. As an out and out Stalwart paper, the Democrat will be less hateful and less mischievous to the Democratic party than it was as "Brick" Pomeroy's insufferable sheet. Now, if the Stalwarts will only take Pomeroy himself, the gratitude of Democrats will be so much more due them.

The Atlanta Sun says: The idea of selecting Grant to a third term was born in the desperate resolve of the army of thieves and plunderers who fattened upon the public spoil during his two former terms, to again attain possession of the Government. To accomplish their purpose they will not hesitate at the commission of any crime or halt before any ordinary obstacle.

THE Post Office Department alone has 100,000 employees to obey the orders of the Republican campaign managers this year.
