On last Saturday quite a crowd assembled at the east end of Skinner's Butte to witness the pigeon shooting match between Dr. Osborne and Frank Belshaw. The trap used was a common open box placed 21 yards distant. Dr. Osborne won the choice of shots and killed his first bird. Mr. Belshaw was not so fortunate the bird escaping. The contestants shot alternately the Dr. killing 5 more birds and one which could not be counted as it fell outside the 80 yards bounds. Mr. Belshaw killed only one bird bringing that down on his fourth shot. With the seventh shot Mr. Belshaw's backers gave up the match as it was then impossible for them to win. The score stood 6 birds and 1 which fell out of bounds, for Dr. Osborne, and 1 bird for Mr. Belshaw. Dr. Osborne has proved himself an excellent shot.

PARDONER.—Governor Thayer recently extended executive clemency to W. H. Crawford, convicted of robbing the railroad safe at the depot in this city, and sentenced at the April term of court 1879, to five years imprisonment in the penitentiary. The Oregonian says that the pardon is granted by reason of "extreme youth, doubt as to commission of the crime, and on condition that he leave the State and not return during the period for which he was sentenced." The reasons advanced by the Governor are not satisfactory. Crawford was a fully matured man, probably 30 years of age, and there could be no doubt that he committed the crime for which he was incarcerated.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.—A lad by the name of Baxter was accidentally shot at the Belknap Springs on the McKenzie last Sunday, by a companion. The ball from the rifle passed through his left leg about four inches above the knee, inflicting a painful but not dangerous wound. It is not thought that the bone was touched. The boy was brought to town and is now under the care of Dr. Sharples.

FROM FOLEYVILLE.—A correspondent writing from Foleyville June 1st, says: These springs are now kept in good order and the hotel is well managed. We have pleasant weather although there is still snow on the mountain tops. Mr. J. Luffery of Junction, had a severe attack of bleeding at the lungs yesterday.
