School Superintendent's Visits.

Miss Alice Montgomery is teaching her first term in No. 12. The attendance is about 25. One of the great drawbacks to this school, and also to a good many more is irregularity in attendance.

The school in Irving, Dist No. 86, is being taught by Mr. A. C. Jennings. He has an average of about 30 pupils, but on account of the fire the previous evening there were but 19 in attendance, and they seemed to be in no very good condition for study; but the school is very well spoken of.

Mr. J. N. Galtra is teaching a good school in Harmony district. He has 27 pupils; last for his illness. year there was 17.

From there I went to No. 15, (Lancaster), and found Miss M Lee with an average of 17. Both of these schools are a decided improvement over those of last in order, deportment and instruction.

Miss Henrietta Tate is teaching a good school in No. 14. Her daily average is 18 pupils. She has had considerable experience in the school room, and brings that to bear in the management of this school.

In district No. 38, Mr. E. A. Judkins is instructing a school of an average attendance of 14. The pupils in this district do not show the same degree of advancement in their studies that they did four years ago. At that time classes were kept up in advanced grammar, algebra, and others were finishing practical arithmetic, whereas at present the most advanced are hardly started in practical arithmetic, and other studies in proportion. This can be accounted for in part by removals.

Mr. H. F. McClure is teaching an excellent school of 38 pupils in Grand Prairie district, No. 21. Both himself and all his scholars well satisfied.

Mr. B. F. Bond is teaching the school in No. 23. Owing to the swales in that vicinity his school was small for some time after the commencement. He has an average of dress by Prof. Condon and the rendition of 17; about as good as for two or three years

> Miss Annie Bushuell is teaching her first term in district No 3. She has an attendance of 34 of an enrollment of 41; her attend- still greater efforts. ance is double that of last year. There is also an improvement in the general appearance of the school. Miss Annie is doing good work.

In Lost Valley district No. 46 Miss Sarah is teaching another good school with an attendance of 22. I think she is giving good satisfaction.

Mr. A. S. Melcher is conducting the school in No. 2 with his usual good success. The school has fallen off by removals from 37 last year to 22.

Mr. A. C. Nickols and wife are near the close of their first term of this school year in Junction City, No. 69. This school has been almost broken up the present session by the measels, in consequence of which, the teachers have had to labor under great discouragements, nevertheless classes have been kept up in surveying, algebra, higher arithmetic and philosophy, in addition to the studies required by law.
