Gen. Hancock Nominated.

Gen Winfield S. Hancock, of New York, was nominated Thursday morning, on the second ballot at Cincinnati, for President. On the first ballot he received 171 votes, and on the second 705 to 30 for Hendricks; 2 for Bayard and 1 for Tilden. His nomination was made unanimous without a dissenting

Gen. Hancock was born in Mont gomery county, Pa., February 14, 1824, and at the at the age of 16 entered West Point. He served as Lieutenant in the Mexican war, and was breveted for gallantry at the battles of Contreas and Cherebusco. In 1850 he married Miss Almira Russell of St. Louis. He served in the Florida wars, and in 1859, came to California. He served throughout the war, winning especial honor at South Mountain, Antietam and Gettys. burg. In the latter battle he was se verely wounded. Near the close of the war he was assigned to the duty of organizing the army of 50,000 veterans from discharged volunteers. He gained the rank of Major General in the war. He was conspicuous among the military commanders of the reconstruction period, and after occupying various posts in the West, he was assigned to the command of the Department of the Atlantic, with headquarters in New York City.

Gen. Hancock has always been a Democrat, and his name has been presented to the National Convention several times by the State of Louisiania. On the first ballot he received most of his strength from the South; 92 votes from those States being cast for him. His record is not smirched by any questionable transaction, such as Credit Mobilier, DeGolyer paving contracts, or back pay salary grabs, but on the contrary he has always borne the name of a pure, upright citizen, and never has there been even a whisper of suspicion against his honesty and integrity. Laying all personal feelings aside we are satisfied there is no man in the United States who can poll as many votes as Gen. Hancock.

So far as the Pacific Coast is concerned, California will surely cast her vote for him, while we believe that with the proper organization, and the healing of all personal differences, we can carry Oregon. The South also will give him its full strength, and New York is now certain to cast her vote lor her honored son. We are confident of success, and believe that the grand old Democratic party will again sweep the country in November from the North to the South and the East to the West, and we will once more have an honest and economical government.

W. H. English was born in Scott county, Indiana, August 27, 1822. He spent three years at the University of Hanover; is a lawyer, but when at home is chiefly devoted to agricultural pursuits. He has been successively Clerk of the House of Representative of Indiana, Clerk in the Treasury Departmeut, Clerk of the State Constitutional Convention, Speaker of the State Legislature, Member of Congress several times, where he acquired national prominence, Regent of the Smithsonian Institute. Mr. English is one of Indiana's ablest sons, and his high character, and spotless reputation, both publie and private, gives strength to the ticket and assures the electoral votes of Indiana
