#### Alaska.

Alaska is as large as all that portion of the United States lying east of the Missirsippi and north of North Carolina. It has 61 volcanoes, and the highest peak on the continent, Mount Elias, 19500 feet. Its largest man. river, the Yukon, is navigable for 1500 miles and for the first 500 miles above its mouth it is from one to five miles in width. South Alaska has winters as mild as those of Kentucky, and Kentucky blue grass grows with the greatest luxuriance. THE GRAIN.-We are informed that in the Willamette Forks, in localities, that a small worm has been doing some damage to fall grain. The worm is found between the second and third joints in each stalk, and is plainly visible with the naked eye. As yet the injury is comparatively small, but if the worm should go into the third joint it would damage the crop greatly. We think, however, that the damage from this pest will be but trifling. The danger from rust has passed, and we are almost sure of an average crop. The late Spring grain is rather short, caused by the absence of rain in the latter part of June.
