Council Proceedings.

REGULAR MEETING, MAY 14, 1880. Council met pursuant to ordinance. Present—President Dorris; Councilmen Dunn, Church, Sloan, McClurg, Edris, and Peters; Recorder and Marshal. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The finance committee reported the following bills correct, and on motion, warrants for the same were ordered drawn on the treasury: S. D. Coats, \$32.50; J. E. Atterberry, \$36; M. Belshaw, 75 cents; S. Holloway, \$13.50; J. C. Tyler, \$4; Geo. Kinsey, \$17.85; J. J. Bell-vail, \$13.40; H. C. Humphrey, \$33.25; E. J. McClanahan, \$5; N. Clark, \$4; T. B. Cleaver, \$16; J. T. Hayes, \$19.80; C. O. Cleaver, \$16.87; S. M. Harrell, \$16.12. Judiciary committee reported ordinance, No. 18 relating to druggists' liquor licenses, which on motion was adopted. In the matter licensing the livery business; reported inexpedient.

Committee on streets reported the opening of the ditch in the northern part of the city and on motion, were instructed to purchase sufficient six inch tile to lay from the mouth of the slough to a point near Mr. Hayes' property. On motion the marshal was instructed to proceed to collect all delinquent tax according to law. The following bills were presented and referred to the finance committee: Wm. Keys, \$68; Springfield Mill Co., \$59.26; S. M. Titus, \$4; K. McGee, \$7.20; Jas. Watkins, \$15; H. C. Humphrey, \$4.60. J. E. Atterberry, 10; C. C. Crouser, \$4.65; Robinson & Church, \$14.12; T. G. Hendricks, \$2.20; S. Holloway, 2; C. C. Cleaver, 6; B. H. James, 2. On motion a delinquent tax of six mills was levied, becoming delinquent August 31st. On motion adjourned. H. C. Salaries Increased. The increase of salaries of postmasters in Oregon under the new adjustment provided by law, gives the following result: Albany, \$2,000, an increase of \$300; Astoria, \$1,600; Baker City, \$1,100; Corvallis, \$1,200, an increase of \$100; Eugene City, \$1,300, an increase of \$100; Oregon City, \$1,500, an increase of \$100; Portland, \$3,000, an increase of \$400; Salem, \$2,000; The Dalles, \$1,800, an increase of \$300. SUIT FOR DAMAGES.—The case of P. B. Johnson against G. W. Evert was called for trial in the United States Circuit Court June 29th. Some time ago Johnson, while engaged in selling county rights for a washing machine in the southern part of the state was arrested on a charge of forging a note. On an examination it was shown that the charge could not be substantiated, and Johnson was released from custody. In return Johnson brought suit in the United States Court against G. W. Evert, who was the one instrumental in having him arrested, for \$4,700 damages, alleging that his arrest was due to malicious prosecution. The case was tried before a jury and at 9 o'clock last night a verdict was returned in favor of defendant. —Portland Standard, June 30th.

HANCOCK CLUB.—At the meeting called for the organization of a Hancock Club, last Saturday evening, a goodly number was present. Hon. R. B. Cochran was chosen chairman and M. S. Wallis, secretary of the meeting. On motion a committee of five were appointed on permanent organization which consists of B. F. Dorris, Jos. Neuhoff, W. P. Cheshire, J. L. Rankin and J. T. Witter. The following were appointed to prepare a constitution and by-laws: I. L. Campbell, M. S. Wallis and J. C. Whiteaker; On motion adjourned until Saturday evening July 17, at 7:30 P. M.

A COLLECTION.—The following sent us from Long Tom in regard to an accident, which happened to a child of B. Elmhaker, explains itself: "The child hurt was a little girl, only 3 years old, and the gate was a new one, which was set up to dry and was braced up by two small staves, when she ran against one, knocking it down and throwing the gate on her. Drowned.

A son of Mr. Jarrett, about ten years old, came to his death Thursday evening, by falling off a boom, just below the Eugene bridge, and drowning. He had been repeatedly warned by his father not to go upon the boom. Thursday evening his father being out of sight and Mr. Nelson, who worked for Mr. J., being across the river, the boy ventured on the boom and fell overboard. He was observed by several parties struggling in the water, but they could render no help as they were on the opposite bank. Up to the time of going to press the body had not been recovered, although a number of our citizens have been dredging the bottom of the river for it. Only a few years ago a man was drowned in the same place, he having fallen off of the ferry boat. The sympathy of the community is extended to Mr. J. in his sad affliction.

Alaska.

Alaska is as large as all that portion of the United States lying east of the Mississippi and north of North Carolina. It has 61 volcanoes, and the highest peak on the continent, Mount Elias, 19,300 feet. Its largest river, the Yukon, is navigable for 1,500 miles and for the first 300 miles above its mouth it is from one to five miles in width. South Alaska has winters as mild as those of Kentucky, and Kentucky blue grass grows with the greatest luxuriance. The Islands along her coast, that were thrown in when we bought her of Russia for \$7,500,000, have paid into the United States treasury since 1871 \$2,500,000, or about four per cent per annum, a fair rent for unimproved real estate.

THE GRAIN.—We are informed that in the Willamette Forks, in localities, that a small worm has been doing some damage to fall grain. The worm is found between the second and third joints in each stalk, and is plainly visible with the naked eye. As yet the injury is comparatively small, but if the worm should go into the third joint it would damage the crop greatly. We think, however, that the damage from this pest will be but trifling. The danger from rust has passed, and we are almost sure of an average crop. The late Spring grain is rather short, caused by the absence of rain in the latter part of June. The acreage is the largest ever sown in Lane.

Ordinance No. 18.

Be it ordained that Sec. 8, of title 111, of chapter 111 be amended to read as follows: For selling or disposing of spirituous or malt liquors in less quantities than one gallon, twenty-five dollars per annum; provided, that druggists may fill prescriptions of practicing physicians for medicinal purposes without such license, and provided further, that this section shall not apply to barrooms; drinking houses, saloons or tipping houses.
