A Question Readily Answered.

A Republican organ asks: "Will some Democratic organ please interview Gen. Hancock and publish his opinions, if he has any?"

Yes; here are some of General Hancock's publicly proclaimed opinions, taken from his noble letter of acceptance of the Democratic nomination for President.

As one people we have common interests. Public office is a trust, not a bounty bestowed upon the holder.

War for the Union was successfully closed more than 15 years ago. The bayonet is not a fit instrument for collecting the votes of freemen.

Neither fraud nor force must be allowed to subvert the rights of the people. Powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, belong to the States respectively or to the people.

The General and State Governments, each acting in its own sphere without trenching upon the lawful jurisdiction of the other constitute the Union.

No form of government, however carefully devised, no principles, however sound, will protect the rights of the people, unless the Administration is faithful and efficient.

If called to the Presidency, I should deem it my duty to resist with all my power any attempt to impair or evade the full force and effect of the Constitution, which, in every article, section and amendment, is the supreme law of the land.

If elected, I shall, with the divine favor, labor with what ability I possess to discharge my duties with fidelity according to my convictions, and to see that the laws be faithfully and equally respected in all parts of the country alike.

Our regular army has little hold upon the affections of the people to-day, and its superior officers should certainly, as far as lies in their power, legally and with righteous intent aim to defend the right, which to us is the one, and the institute they represent. It is a well meaning institution, and it would be well if it should have an opportunity to be recognized as a bulwark in support of the people and of the law.

The Bee has an idea that Harvey Scott will kill Mitchell and Dolph in their Senatorial aspirations and crown Dave Thompson with the honors, but the chances are about three to five that the next Legislature will be owned by the Democrats and some such man as Honest John Whiteaker be the Senator.

There are about five hundred precincts in the State. A change of two votes in each will make Oregon Democratic, even on the June election. Let Democrats in every precinct see that two are gained, and be sure to make the number five. Oregon must be placed in the Democratic column.

A Republican Deign on Garfield.

Marat Halstead's Cincinnati Commercial thus spoke of Garfield, March 31, 1873: "And Garfield's noble soul was sadly perturbed. He looked upon the scene with grave apprehensions, and regarded this unseemly persecution of the righteous with such horror that his soul was sick within him. He came near making a fatal blunder once. After Ames had testified the second time as to the guilt of Garfield, fixing it upon him clearly and unmistakably, the General at once notified them that he would come before them and refute the vile slanders that the gentleman from Massachusetts had poured out against him. The day and the hour came, but simultaneously came not Garfield. He had heard that Ames (who was then reluctantly producing the receipts that Patterson had signed) had in his possession other such documents to prove the correctness of his testimony in respect to others; and the gallant general, whose flashing blade was wont to gleam adown the line in the grey days of the past decade, found that to stay was prudent, and he never appeared. The complacent committee forebode to question Ames further as to Garfield's statement and his own and the papers were consequently never produced."

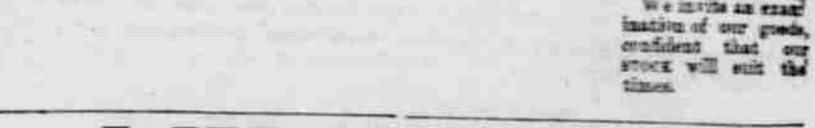
