"The facts in regard to Mr. Garfield, as found by the committee, are identical with the case of Mr. Wm. D. Kelley to the point of receipt of the check for \$329. He agreed with Mr. Ames to take ten shares of Credit Mobilier stock, but did not pay for the same. Mr. Ames received the 80 per cent. dividends in bonds, and sold them for 97 per cent., and also received the 63 per cent. cash dividends which together paid the price of the stock and interest and left a balance of \$329. This sum was paid over to Mr. Garfield by a check on the Sergeant at Arms, and Mr. Garfield then understood this sum was the balance of dividends after paying for the stock."

Democracy North and South.

The stalwart Republican finds himself in the campaign with but one issue with which to bait back the solid phalanx of the Democratic party. His only cry, saved from the wreck of former principles is that of solid South. No other war cry is left him to again fire the Northern heart and set his party wild with enthusiasm as of yore. His organs and stump speakers declare and affect to believe that the Democratic party is in the hands of the Southerner. The fallacy of this is amply proven by comparing the vote of the North and South for Tilden. The north gave 2,682,688 votes, and the South 1,613,082, the majority in favor of the party at the North being 1,068,706. It requires a vast stretch of imagination to seriously believe that the Southern minority can control this vast Northern majority.

Again. Take that tier of States extending from the Atlantic to the Mississippi comprising Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Indiana, Ohio and Illinois, all of which are Northern States. They represent a population of 19,418,000, nearly half of the entire republic. They embrace a great portion of the capital, business enterprise, educational centres, manufacturing interests and intelligence of the nation. In 1876 they cast 1,861,312 Democratic votes and 1,852,821 Republican, a majority of nearly 10,000 for the Democracy. And yet the Radical leaders would have us believe that the North is as clay in their hands, out of which to form a solid North for farther oppression of the South. Their assumption that the North will be solid in November is not founded on fact. The first swell of the tidal wave that will overwhelm the Radical legions has struck Maine and will gather force until in November it will hurl the corrupt and bigoted party from the position which it has so long occupied.

THE Republicans are getting desperate, and as a consequence their servant, the telegraph, that deserves a better master, is daily grinding out prejudiced and in part lying statements, which will, they hope, benefit their sinking fortunes. The latest is a report that Hancock has written a noncommittal letter on the Southern claims bugaboo. The Republicans will not profit by experience. They raised a tremendous howl about Hancock's letter to Sherman, which forced the publication of that admirable Democratic campaign document. If Hancock has written a letter on claims, it may be depended upon that the Republicans will gain nothing from it.

THE Legislature has got down to work, and bills are as thick about the capitol, as snowflakes in a snow storm. From all indications the rate of interest will be lowered, and considerable reductions made in fees, principally those paid to clerks and sheriffs.

The Office-Holders Fund.

The Republican managers are relying mainly upon the pecuniary aid and political activity of office-holders for the success of their canvass, and are taxing them to the utmost to compensate for the lukewarmness of great factions of the party. "The spider's touch" of the Republican National Committee "feels at each thread" of the post routes and customs collection districts. It casts its web over the departments in Washington, and entangles even the humble type-setters of the Government Printing House in the network. Not only every postmaster and tidewater, but even every mechanic and laborer in Federal employment understands that he is liable to be ejected by his superiors unless he contributes money or time to electioneer for Mr. Garfield and Mr. Arthur. Four out of every five dollars in the party treasury are derived from this source. At least as large a proportion of the Republican speakers who are perambulating the doubtful states to-day, are holding commissions in the Federal service, and are impelled to their exertions by anxiety to retain them or to exchange them for others more dignified or more lucrative. The remembrance of the professions of President Hayes concerning civil service reform at the opening of his administration enhances the shame of the exhibition by tainting it with the element of hypocrisy.

In the good old times when the Democracy ruled the nation the disgraceful spectacle was never seen of a President making a political junketing trip. The Cabinet officers never left their posts at Washington to mount the political rostrum and harangue the public from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Republican administrations have brought disgrace upon the country by allowing these paid government officials to dishonor their stations by taking part in the political canvass. Secretaries Sherman, Thompson and Schurz—the last a model reformer—each receive from the people the munificent salary of \$8,000 a year, or nearly \$30 for each working day. And yet a great part of their time is given to performing service for the Republican party in conventions, on the stump, and in their offices. It is such flagrant violations of the constitution as this that has caused the independent element to forsake the corrupt venal Republican party, and cast their votes with a party whose past history is a promise of honesty and reform in the future, should they succeed.

A Policy of Hate.

It will be noticed by the intelligent reader, the Norristown Register, alleges, that the attack by Republican organs and orators is almost exclusively against the Southern people. It is a war of sectionalism which, if continued, must end in disunion. It is a sentiment aroused by appeal to passion and is founded on falsehood and disgraceful vituperation of the people of a section of our country because they do not entertain similar "political ideas" with their traducers. Republican success in next November means that this will continue. They promise it, indeed, and boldly assert that there can be no compromise with the Southern people until they surrender their manhood, their elective franchise, and submit to be governed by a Republican Administration at Washington.

FROM MAINE.

The latest returns from Maine indicate that Plaised the Fusion candidate for Governor has received a plurality of about 174. The constitutional amendments, which provide that a plurality may elect are carried. The Republicans are defeated in their stronghold, and Maine is placed in the list of doubtful November States. The Greenback convention numbering 465 delegates met at Portland, Me., Sept. 22d, and named an electoral ticket, four of which are for Weaver, and three for Hancock. A small portion of this Greenback convention, numbering 73 delegates, split off, and nominated a straight Greenback electoral ticket.

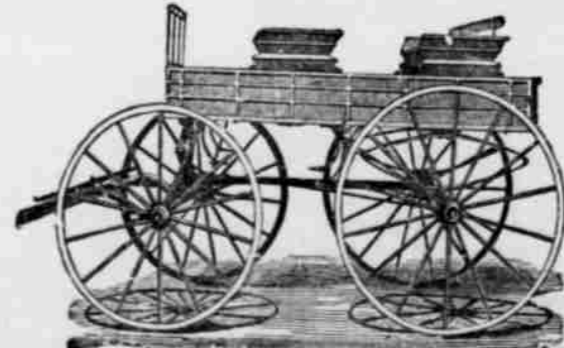
