REMARKABLE ACCIDENT. The Lake County Examiner has the following account of an accident which recently befall George Hamersley, formerly a resident of Camp Creek in this county: "On Thomas creek last Saturday George Hamersley had his hand badly smashed between the end of a wagon tongue and a tree. The wagon had just been hauled and had about 7,000 feet of logs on. Mr. Hamersley took hold of the tongue of the wagon to move it a short distance down the hill to get it out of the way of another wagon which was to be loaded. He "cramped" the wagon to avoid running it against a stump, and did not notice that the tongue was pointed directly towards a tree. The tongue of the wagon struck the tree with great force and caught his hand, which was over the end of the tongue. Strange to say, no bones were broken, although the force of the blow was so great as to dent the bark of the tree full two inches deep. Assistance being at hand, the wagon was pulled backwards and Mr. Hamersley released. His hand was frightfully mangled and bruised by the blow, and was also badly lacerated in freeing it from between the wagon tongue and the tree.
