The complete returns for Oregon have been received. The State has a population of 174,767 of which, 103,338 are males and 71,429 females; the males predominating by 32,009. The colored population, including Chinese, Japanese, Indians, Negroes, and Half-breeds number 11,680.
Lane county has a population of 9,411, of which 5,074 are males, and 4,337 females; excess of males, 737; native born, 9,021; foreign, 390; white, 9,247; colored, 164, of which 39 are Chinese, and 122 Indians and half breeds, and 3 Negroes.
