ACCIDENTALLY KILLED.

On Wednesday morning, a Mr. Orion, a farmer living a short distance below Junction, met his death almost instantly. He was harrowing with a team of four horses abreast, and being somewhat blind allowed the horses to run against a stump. He left the rear of the harrow and went to the head of the horses, endeavoring to get them clear of the obstruction; while in that position holding the leads of the two middle horses, the team from some reason became unmanageable, and started to run. He held to their heads for a short time but was at length knocked down and ran over by the horses and harrow, receiving wounds that caused his instant death. He was either stepped on by the horses or hit by an end of the harrow on his left breast over the heart, crushing his ribs and causing death. The harrow teeth inflicted two wounds, one on his head, and the other just below the small of his back, but neither was of much consequence. The deceased was 63 years of age, and was a brother-in-law of Mr Wm Edris and Mr. Swift of this city. The funeral took place at Junction Friday, Rev I D Driver preaching the funeral sermon, after which the remains were taken to Harrisburg for interment.

Grange Lecture.

Judge R P Boise, Master Oregon State Grange, delivered a lecture at the Court House, Saturday, upon the Grange and other subjects that affect the farmer. The speaker expatiated upon the merits of the Grange; its social aspects, and the advantage to be gained by the farmers meeting together and freely discussing the best modes of farming, thus benefitting each other by giving their experience and knowledge derived from observation. Judge Boise adverted to the monopoly question that is forcing itself upon the laboring classes of the country, by reason of the money kings buying up and controlling all competing railway lines and telegraph lines, thus leaving the country at their mercy. He advocated restrictive legislation, limiting their extortions to fair and just rates. The lecture was attentively listened to by a fair audience.
