The Latest Bourbonism.

The Republican press has a fancy for calling the Democratic opponents in Virginia "Bourbons." This is supposed to be crushing. It is a device as old as the hills, and as weak as it is old, to apply ugly epithets to opponents. The Bourbonism, in this case, happens to consist of a rigid, high minded and honorable adherence to a just obligation; a firm determination to honestly stand by an adjustment of the state indebtedness made between the State and its creditors, and accepted by both. Mahone is a "Readjuster," that is, he favors repudiating the adjustment that has been made, to the extent of a great many millions. It is not at all remarkable that the man who advocated cheating public creditors should be amenable to direct bribery in his political action. But it is remarkable that a great party, that professes to uphold the good credit of every portion of the country, should bargain with with a traitor to give him patronage with which to strengthen a state organization whose object is the repudiation of honest debts. It is also singular that the "independent" papers have nothing but good to say of the bargain, whilst really stalwart organs like the New York Times, the Philadelphia Times and Chicago Tribune declare it to be a grossly immoral transaction that bodes no good to the Republican party.

Stanley Jay Gould Withdraws.

New York Sun. Mr. Ashmead Bartlett had the words Burdett-Countis added to his name before his marriage; and if Mr. Stanley Matthews is to be confirmed as a Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States it ought to be a condition precedent that he should change his name to Stanley Jay Gould Matthews as more accurately and fully descriptive of the real person who in case of his confirmation is to assume the ermine.

It is said that Gen. Garfield has not heart the confirmation of this nomination. We shall have a chance to see how much power a new administration can put forth in the way of controlling votes in the Senate.

Fragrant flowers from the White House conservatory, consulships, appointment to post offices, and so on, all to buy votes for an unworthy candidate for the Supreme Court! Will it work? We shall see.

Republican Methods.

This is the opinion of the Philadelphia Times, Republican, as to the revolutionary methods of Republicans in the last Congress.

"The Republican revolutionary leaders who follow Conger have defeated the Congressional apportionment, forced the veto of the Funding bill, placed the Republican party in the position of systematically decrying the national credit and compelling some twenty States to submit to extra sessions of their Legislatures. They wanted an extra session of Congress to start the old patent outrage mills in the South and get possession of a few paltry offices about the Senate and House, and they may succeed in securing a few places and bring general defeat on the Republican party."

Since his recent visit to the South, Colonel McClure of the Times has very freely denounced the false cry of "Southern outrages."

From present indications the political complexion of the U. S. Senate will depend on the next election in Oregon between 1885 and 1885. The Senate is now a tie, counting the repudiating Mahone as a republican. The next change will be in 1883 then Kellogg of Louisiana will be succeeded by a Democrat, and the only Democrat whose term then expires is Grover of Oregon. Now, should the republicans be successful in all of the doubtful States, then the Senate would still remain a tie, and the Vice President would hold the casting vote, but should Grover be succeeded by a Democrat, then the deadlock would be broken, and the Democrats would have control. The election of Representatives in Oregon at the next election will assume greater importance than at any previous time in the history of the state.—News.

Sad Disaster at Yaquina Bay.

A correspondent of the Standard at Newport, Benton county, sends it the particulars of a sad calamity which took place at Yaquina Bay on Thursday, April 7th: The tug boat Gen G H Wright, recently purchased by the U S Government for the use of the government engineers on this Coast was sent from Astoria to Yaquina Bay and anchored between the bay and Cape Foulweather, waiting for a pilot. Subsequently Captain Pennell took his small boat and three men and proceeded to buoy the channel, so that he could bring the tug in. It was about half ebb tide when he reached the outer portion of the bar. The sea was very rough and breaking furiously over the bar. The boat was very small and the first breaker that struck her filled her. The second breaker capsize her and all hands washed off. Two of the men swam to the boat. Parties on the shore watched the catastrophe in horror, but as no boat could live in that terrible sea they were powerless to rescue. Mr. Polhemus offered two Indians one hundred dollars if they would rescue the two men on the shipwrecked boat. They tried it but failed. Tracy and Zenas Davis succeeded in getting to the boat and rescued the only man clinging to the boat—the only survivor of the four that started out from the tug. The body of Captain Pennell afterwards came ashore on the north beach, inside of the point of rocks. The bodies of the other two men are still in the ocean. Mr. Polhemus and Tracy Davis, after the catastrophe, went to Cape Foulweather, and taking a boat proceeded out beyond the breakers and boarded the tug. At high water they brought her safely into the bar.
