Gen. Jos. Lane Dead.

The veteran warrior and statesman, Gen. Joseph Lane, is no more. Quietly and peacefully at his home in Roseburg, Tuesday night, April 19th, at 8:45 o'clock, his soul took flight from its mortal tenement. For several weeks he had been gradually failing, and but few were surprised when the not unwelcome messenger, to him, gave the final summons.

Gen. Lane's life was an eventful one. Born in North Carolina in 1801, his life is almost co-eval with the Republic. In 1823 he was elected to the Indiana Legislature, where he continued until 1846, when he resigned his seat in the Senate to enter the ranks of the army then being raised for the war with Mexico. He was soon raised from a private to the rank of a Brigadier, and then a Major General; he was present and engaged in many of the hard fought battles of that war, and bore honorable wounds attesting his bravery. At the close of the war in 1848, he was appointed, by President Polk, Governor of Oregon Territory; made the trip overland by the southern route, arrived in Oregon City, March 2, 1849, and on the same day issued a proclamation making known that the Territory was then under the laws and control of the United States. In 1851 he was elected a Delegate to Congress, which position he successively held four terms. On the admission of the State in 1859 he was elected a Senator retiring therefrom in 1861. The ability displayed by him in the Senate induced the regular Democratic convention in 1860 to nominate him for Vice President; the split in the party however caused the defeat of the ticket upon which he ran. Since that time he has lived in private life, but his influence has been exerted nevertheless, and his opinions have had great weight in shaping public events in this State. His name is interwoven with the pioneer history of our fair young State, and his acts have redounded to her glory. No stain has ever attached to his fair fame. Honor was his guiding star, and while others became rich from office he never profited therefrom and died poor. Rest in peace honorable old man! Few names in our country's history are brighter than thine.

Garfield's Happy Thought.

President Garfield says that in appointing Judge Robertson Collector he was guided by a desire to promote harmony in the Republican party of New York.

It was a happy thought of the President's that he would promote harmony in the Republican party. Harmony in the Republican party of the State of New York needs a great deal of promoting just at present; but the President's way of doing this most desirable thing cannot be complimented as eminently successful. On the contrary, he hit the biggest hornet's nest a powerful blow; and he is likely to learn that some of the occupants are stinging.

It is pleasant to be informed that Mr. Blaine had nothing whatever to do with Judge Robertson's appointment. Oh, no; not he; why should he have had anything to do with it? What should he care? It is nothing to him.

He is a little lamb, and would like to be out in the pastures, verdant as himself, climbing the rocks and skipping about with the other little lambs, if only he was not shut up in that horrid, dingy old State Department. He to have anything to do with the appointment of Judge Robertson! Never! He scorns the imputation. It was the cat or Gail Hamilton, that did it.

We sincerely believe that Mr. Blaine had no more to do with the matter than he would have had if he himself had been President of the United States, in his own name.—N. Y. Sun.

A Family Accusation.

The New York Times, the most stalwart of Republican organs, sees danger to its party in the purchase of Mahone. It says that "if his present co-operation with the Republicans involves the use of patronage in Virginia to promote repudiation it will be very dearly bought. The party cannot sustain the public faith in the nation and nurse repudiation in a State. Such compromises are far reaching in their influence, and wherever it reaches that influence is vicious and unwholesome."

Disraeli Dead.

The English author, orator and statesman, Benjamin Disraeli, Earl of Beaconsfield, died at London on the 18th inst, of bronchial asthma and gout, added to the old age, in his 76th year. A bright light has gone out and the darkness is felt the wide world over. One of England's greatest statesman, the leader of the traditional conservatism of the "old nobility," he himself a parvenu in the ranks, and a writer whose name will live in the literary annals of his time, though without such achievements as would give it high place on the roll of authorships of the adventurous attributes of his personal and political career had not raised him to an eminence from which there was no displacement, has gone upon the final pilgrimage to eternity.

Before his acceptance, the Queen had more than once offered Disraeli the honors of the peerage, which he modestly refused. He was always sensitive; the crime of Beaconsfield did not blunt feelings of the Commoner, nor was the exalted author of Endymion of different stuff from the ambitious Vivian Grey; and it has been admitted fact in political circles in Great Britain that the ex-Premier was never the same man since he was forced by the voice of the country to surrender the prestige of power, even though sustained by the sympathies of the Queen. Since the victory of Gladstone a perceptible falling off in the energy of Disraeli, that almost bordered on indifference, has been noticeable, and when once in the clutches of disease he had not the fire of "stern old baron Rudiger."—he could not or would not rally.—Standard.

Rewarding Crime.

It is a bad time of year for women holding Postoffices, who have no better claim upon a Republican Administration than their own services to the Union, or those of their husbands. Mrs. Van Lew, the Postmistress of Richmond, described by the Republican papers of Virginia as a brave Union woman during the war, who sacrificed social position and property for her patriotic convictions, has been removed to make room for one of Mahone's men, an ex-Confederate and a repudiationist.

The fact that the Roadbuster Club, of Petersburg, Virginia, has publicly denounced Senator Mahone for his course puts an end to the claim that Mahone has the full support of his party. Petersburg is the stronghold of the Roadbusters and the home of Mahone.
