

The Canyon Road Matter.

Portland City Election.

Important Decision.

Last week in Portland the jury in the case of Marshall & Co., (the warehouseman who held the wheat that was damaged by the flood last winter), against the Bank of British Columbia returned a verdict in favor of the bank.

The lowest bid for supplying postmasters with all official and registered package envelopes for the year commencing July 1st, is \$54,720. The bid is based on the number of envelopes 28,977,250 used during the year ending March 31, 1881, and which cost the United States \$100,810.

Charles Brown, Dennis Cunniff and Will Lake had slain and rendered to oil some 60 sea lions out at Orford reef, up to Sunday last. The oil is barreled for export, but it is not the only resource in the sea lion business, as what are called trimming-bristles, a portion of the hide, etc., being valuable in the market.

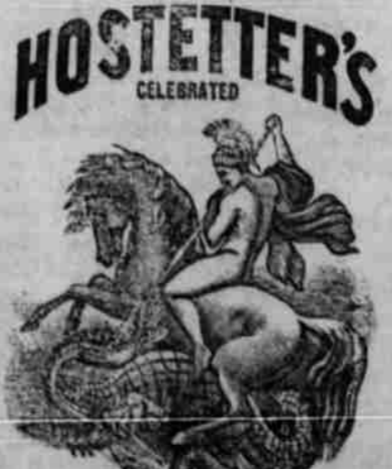
