Telegraphic.

WASHINGTON, Aug 16, 11 P M.—To night's bulletin indicates some little improvement in the president. The doctors say this much; they say he is holding his own, which is all they could ask under the circumstances, as their object is to keep him from pulling back any while his stomach gets well. The second teaspoonful of beef juice given him this afternoon nauseated him a little. That passed off, and the nourishment remained on his stomach. The doctors then concluded not to administer any more for several hours, but intend to try to give a teaspoonful about every two hours through the night. If his stomach will retain it, they say immediate and satisfactory improvement in the case may be counted upon.

Secretary Blaine said the case was not as bad as he expected, and he still hoped. About 7 o'clock Dr Boynton, who is a constant attendant of the president, and who is very frank in giving statements of the case, says the president is certainly better. I will not say much better, but there is some improvement apparent to all around him and especially to himself. At 9 P M the president's pulse was 110.

The following cablegram was sent to Minister Lowell by Secretary Blaine. "At 10:30 tonight the president's condition is not essentially changed. The situation, though more hopeful than yesterday or before, is still extremely critical and fills everyone with deep anxiety."

The following cablegram was received at the executive mansion this afternoon: OSBORN, Aug 17. Mrs Garfield, Washington:—I am anxious to know how the president is to day and to express my deep sympathy with you and yours.
