Council Proceedings.

COUNCIL ROOMS, EUGENE CITY, Sept. 17, 1881.

Council met pursuant to adjournment. Present—Mayor Hendricks, Councilmen Campbell, Johnson, Etris, Sloan, Peters and Lauer, and Recorder and Marshal.

The judiciary committee reported recommending a change in the cow law and were instructed to present an ordinance to that effect at the next regular meeting.

On motion, the Recorder was instructed to present an ordinance at the same time empowering the President of the Council of such other person as they deem best, to act as Recorder pro tem in his absence.

On motion, the Recorder was instructed to revise the assessment, allowing residents only to deduct indebtedness.

On motion, a tax of five mills was levied on all assessable property within the corporate limits of the city; the same to become delinquent Nov. 1, 1881.

On motion, a sidewalk was ordered laid from Olive to Willamette street on the north side of Sixth street.

On motion, the street committee was instructed to see that the ditch in the northern part of the city be properly cleaned.

The marshal was instructed to present at the next regular meeting an itemized statement of the delinquent tax not collected.
