Yaquina Bay Railroad.

Yaquina Bay is directly west of Albany will be somewhat greater. At the mouth of ber: the bay is a good light-house, and a light which can be seen a distance of thirteen Lillian Andrews, miles, and which will doubtless hereafter

be used as a harbor light. Work on the railroad has almost entirely been suspended, as it is impossible to successfully work during the rainy season. However, about 300 men are still in the employ of the company. Part of this force is at work on a road cut about 22 miles west of Corvallis. Another gang is engaged in similar work near Toledo, and still anothe is busy laying off and staking out the future town at the western terminus of the road. at a point on the bay between Oneatta and Ford's point.

Four surveying parties are now locating the road finally between the western end of the grade and the bay, and as soon as that is done they have instructions to proceed to Corvallis, and from that point commence at once the work of surveying the route east towards Albany and from there on across the valley to Eastern Oregon.

Next spring work will be resumed on the road with renewed energy. Already contracts have been signed with Chinese contractors for 5,000 Chinamen, who will com, mence work as soon as spring opens. The company will also need about 3,000 white laborers and 2,000 teamsters with teams.

We learn that six large and powerful comotives of the very best manufacture have been purchased and will be forwarded to the bay as soon as track-laying is commenced. Steel rails sufficient to lay 135 miles have been already purchased and 6,000 tons have safely arrived in San Francisco, and will be taken to the bay as soon as work is commenced.-Albany Exchange.

All business is suspended, stores and business houses of all kinds are closed, even to our meat markets, and our milk is cut off. I was fortunate enough to secure a large sized venisen before it was too late, and use condensed milk from my store. Dr Swineburn says there is 25 cases in Heppner and vicinity. Up to this time there have been only two deaths, Miss Yarlett, and Mrs Barker, widow of John Barker, who was kitled here by Billy Jones a few weeks ago.
