The Spills System

Now that Congress is in session, says the American Register, is the time to provide remedies for the manifold defects in our political system of appointments to office, as rewards for political services, at the dictation, not only corrupting, but tending to the ultimate destruction of the Government. And it is indubitable that the nomination of President Coolidge was one of the odious results of this mode of distributing the offices, honors and emoluments of the Government. Coolidge had been on the stump, and had asked all he could in the election of President Coolidge. And he came on to Washington and demanded an office as a reward for his services, and when refused, he was disappointed and disgraced, and in the spirit he had in view for the President and finally shot him. This dire result is a warning to Congress sufficient to require an immediate remedy for the evils of the "spills system." Let a term of office be fixed and no removal be made without cause explicitly specified, and submitted to the Senate for its approval. Other and better means may perhaps be provided.

The evils of the spills system, we believe, can be effectively prevented against by legislation, but if not, and an amendment of the Constitution be necessary, then that should be proposed in Congress at once. There are several modes of reform in this respect by an amendment of the Constitution. One is the appointment of one commission to act with the head of each department in which appointments are to be made, either making appointments or removals. In any event the appointing power should be taken out of the hands of the President entirely. For this has been the cause of the great popular commotions and commotions at the Presidential elections, which have not only corrupted the elections, but also disturbed the peace and tranquility of the country.
