The Chinese Bill.

From Eastern dispatches we take the following concerning the final passage of the Chinese Bill in the House of Representative, March 23d. It will be seen at a glance by the vote that the Republican majority is in favor of Chinese immigration and is opposed to the poor white laborer, while on the other hand, the Democracy has proven itself to be the friend and protector of the poor. The dispatch says: "An analysis of the vote on the final passage of the measure without any amendment shows a much larger proportion of Republican votes for it in the House than in the Senate, there being 65 Republicans and 102 Democratic representatives recorded in the affirmative and 61 Republican and 4 Democrats in the negative." Although passed in both the Senate and House by over two-thirds vote, still it seems to be the opinion of Eastern Republicans that the president will veto the measure. If such should be the case Oregon and the whole Pacific Coast would, we believe, become thoroughly Democratic. But the moral of the whole affair is that Republican promises are worthless, while the Democrats may be relied on to redeem their pledges.

Elevators.

The project of shipping grain in bulk in Oregon seems to meet with favor from all practical men who have investigated the subject. A reliable farmer and grain dealer informs us that the sacks now used, with common handling, would market the crops of five years, should the elevator system be introduced. This alone after the first year would be a saving of six to seven cents per bushel. The grain would be loaded and unloaded at a nominal cost, and the wastage that is now expe rienced in handling sacks, and from rats and mice, would totally cease.

THE sad exhibition of mob law at Prineville, by which to all appearances, at least one innocent man was deprived of his life, is the legitimate fruit of the murders committed a short time since by the mob at Seattlewhich at that time was commended by the greater portion of the press. Those that sow the wind shall reap the whirlwind, and nothing is more certain than than that the communities which have allowed these unlawful excesses, will in time find that it would have been far better to trust to the law. Oregon, says the Weston Leader, is now approaching an important election. It is barely possible that the political complexion of the United States Senate will depend on the result of the coming June election in this State. Consequently an unusual and earnest effort must be made to reconcile any existing causes of dissension, and this by all yielding to the governing princi ple of right. Let all selfishness be banished.

Taxing Federal Officials.

The New York Times, a leading Republican paper of the United States, yet one opposed to taxing Federal Officials for party purposes, admits in a recent issue that \$250,000 were used in the October election in Indiana in 1880, the greater part of which were used in the October election in Indiana in 1880, the greater part of which was collected from Federal officers, and

A New York grand jury has recently indicted a Federal official, Special Treasury Agent Curtis, for asking for money for political purpose from Government employes. We do not believe that the indictments will be made to stick; nevertheless we hall it as a movement in the right direction. New York was carried in the same way for Garfield in 1880. Every good citizen should unsparingly condemn this corruption. It corrupts the people; and enables the dominant party to perpetuate itself in power where there is really an ovewhelmning majority against it.

Too WEALTHY. - Think of the enor mous wealth of Wm. H. Vanderbilt His income from U. S. bonds alone amounts to at least \$2,000,000 or \$5,479 while that from other sources must be great also. And yet he toils, and strives and slaves still! A man with too much money is frequently as worried and fretted as a man with too little. This modern Crosus-besides ough. whom he of ancient times was a mere pauper--has more trouble to-day in taking care of his wealth than he ever had in making it. It is such reflections as these that reconcile us to newspaper drudgery, and enable us to look with contempt upon the toilers dangling over dizzy Molechian precipices.

The indications are very plain that this is the off year for the Republicans. The elections East for local officers have shown Democratic gains everywhere, and at Sacramento, last week, they gained control of the city government-Last year the Democrats elected the Mayor, who is called First Trustee. On Tuesday the Third Trustee by a majority of 507, and so obtain control of the City Government for the first time in its history. This is not doing badly in a constituency that was long accustomed to give a Republican majority of about 900.


