

Democratic State Convention.

A Democratic State Convention is hereby called to meet at Portland, on Wednesday, April 5th, 1882, at 11 o'clock, A. M., for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Congress a candidate for Governor, a candidate for Chief Justice, a candidate for Secretary of State, a candidate for State Treasurer, a candidate for Superintendent of Public Instruction, a candidate for Prosecuting Attorney in each of the Judicial Districts, and to transact such other business as may come before the convention.

The committee suggests, unless otherwise ordered by the local committees, that the primaries be held on Saturday, March 25th, and the County Conventions on Wednesday, March 29th. By order of the Democratic State Central Committee.

Custodian Pitney's Disclosures.

The Washington Gazette devotes a full page to the testimony of ex-Custodian Pitney before the Senate Committee investigating the Treasury Contingent Fund expenditures. It reviews the methods by which Mr. Sherman's campaign rooms in Washington were filled up and supplied with stationery, and tells how Mr. Sherman, when asked to assist in refunding what could not be charged to the Treasury expenses, affected ignorance and left his subordinates to pay most of the bills. Pitney says that when he heard he was to be removed he went to Mr. Window to plead his case, and that Mr. Window justified the intention of removal by saying that "he had to satisfy newspaper clamor." Several folios of the testimony relate to the purchase of flowers from the Contingent Fund for the private use of Mr. Sherman and Mr. Window. They were charged on the books as plants furnished for the garden. The floral gifts presented to the outgoing and incoming Secretaries of the Treasury were charged to the Contingent Fund. Sherman pleads ignorance as to where the money was coming from, but, when he found an expensive campaign being conducted in his behalf by his subordinates, it is curious that he did not inquire how the money was being found.

ROUGH ON CATTLE.—Reports from every section, says the Prieville News, regarding the condition of stock, agree on the one particular point, that there will be a heavy loss. The extraordinary deep snow and late spring has left cattle extremely poor and weak, and of ready many carcasses may be seen, even in the immediate vicinity of town.
