LATEST NEWS SUMMARY.

A special committee of the New York assembly unanimously recommends the passage of a bill looking to putting underground all telegraph wires.

Fitzgerald, one of the Iowa escaped convicts, has been captured in a barn four miles from Fort Madison. Cook and Wells are supposed to be in the woods.

The Historical Society of New York will ask the city to co-operate November 25, 1883, in celebrating the 100th anniversary of the evacuation of the city by the British.

A movement is on foot in Cincinnati for the organization of a board of arbitration to decide differences between employers and employees now being applied to the carpenters' strike in progress there.

The May musical festival opened in New York on the evening of May 5th with an audience of nearly 8000 people. Thomas and his orchestra chorus and Frau Materna were well received and the latter was called before the curtain five times.

A mass meeting was held at Liberty, Clay county, Mo., on the 21st inst., near the homes of the James boys, and resolutions passed endorsing Gov. Crittenden's action, and expressing full sympathy with him in his warfare against the bandits.

The twenty-fourth annual report of the chamber of commerce says: It is apparent to a close observer that the United States is entering upon a critical period in its progress when economic and financial questions require the most careful examination.

A telegram has been received at Chicago to the effect that the syndicate who purchased the Booth theater estate for \$500,000 have failed to make the second payment of \$125,000 on May 1st, and that Oliver Ames retains possession and has leased the theater to John Stetson.

Three old books which arrived in New York by mail from Europe recently were found to have been neatly hollowed and filled with diamonds. The jewelry was valued at \$3500. The package was addressed to the leading jeweler at Cincinnati, but found its way to the custom house.

Jos. McClark, charged with attempting to practice Mormonism outside of Utah, was placed in jail at Lancaster, Wis., on the 21st. So far as heard from, Clark has been in possession of four wives, three of whom are now living. He is very quiet and has little to say, evidently recognizing his chances for a prolonged stay at Waupun penitentiary.

The Inter-Ocean makes a mysterious but prominent announcement that an advanced step in railroadization has been discovered which will revolutionize that service and put it fifty years ahead of the age. It says officials of six of the largest and most enterprising roads in Mississippi valley have been for two days discussing the new improvement, the notice of which will be announced in a few days.

Jas. B. Doyle is on trial in the U. S. court at Chicago on charge of having been connected with counterfeiting U. S. bonds. The case is a celebrated one, as the bonds were so skillfully wrought as to deceive the treasurer and bank experts, and the amount was upwards of \$200,000. This is a new trial, the former verdict against him being invalidated by an informality. There seems to be little doubt as to the facts of his guilt.

The number of Jewish refugees arriving in Germany is constantly increasing. On the 21st 192 women and children, whose relatives had already emigrated, were forwarded to Hamburg, with 98 Jews from Jassy. The assembly of Polish Jews pronounced in favor of emigration to Palestine, and 700 families have applied to the emigration committee at Jassy for assistance to enable them to settle in Palestine.

A Denver dispatch of May 23 says: The corner stone of the National Mining and Industrial Exposition building was formally laid this afternoon by Gov. Hittin in the presence of several thousand people. An eloquent oration was delivered by Hon. T. M. Patterson, and an address was made by Judge W. S. Decker. The occasion was made a partial holiday by business men and citizens. The large force of men actively employed on the building insures its completion in time to open the exposition on August 1st.

The third regiment cavalry has been ordered by General Crook to proceed by rail immediately to Deming, N. M., to participate in the campaign against hostile Apaches. The fourth infantry regiment is under orders and will go forward soon. Four companies of the third cavalry at Cheyenne, two at Fort Steele and one at Fort Sanders, take the U. S. P. to Denver and from there proceed by rail to the destination. Two companies from Fort McKinney and two companies from Fort Washkiki will march to the railroad as soon as possible, and follow them in a few days.

Mrs. W. F. Bainbridge, of Providence, R. I., gave an address on the women of China and Japan in Chicago on the 21st. She has spent considerable time in those countries in missionary work. "The Women," she said, "exerted a powerful influence in Asia and through them that country will most readily be converted to Christianity. Still they are very degraded and very ignorant. I saw a Chinaman one day going to market with five baby girls in a basket and he said he hoped to get as high as 40 cents apiece for them." Said the speaker, "not one woman in a hundred can read, but they are willing to learn, especially from teachers of their own sex."

Judge Brooks, of Boston, has given a decision which sets aside several bequests in the will of Longfellow. The decision is that estates may be considered no part of the will and interlineations of no effect. This deprives each of the children and testator's brother of a legacy of \$10,000 and makes void a legacy of \$5000 to his brother Stephen. The decision is made upon the ground that a will cannot be altered except by codicil. The will was admitted to probate and Ernest W. Longfellow appointed administrator in place of Richard H. Dana, named in the will.

The Newburg cotton mill is shut down owing to a strike. Four hundred hands are out of employment.

Advices from Gunnison contradict the reported killing of Sheriff Bowman and Deputy Brink by cattle thieves.

Polk Wells and Cook, escaped penitentiary birds and murderers, of Iowa, were arrested by a farmer and son on the 4th. Secretary Teller has appointed Hon. Noah P. Laveridge, of Coldwater, Mich., assistant solicitor general of the interior department.

J. C. Palmer, of Jerico, has received his commission as U. S. assistant district attorney for Dakota. He will assume his duties on June 1st.

The overdue steamer Quebec, from Liverpool to Quebec and Montreal, has put in at Halifax, unable to reach her destination owing to heavy ice.

General Hazen, chief signal officer, has addressed a letter to the secretary of war asking efficient means for the arrest of Howgate and all power of government to bring him to trial.

Lieut. Danenhower was received by the emperor and empress at St. Petersburg on the 21st. On the day following he visited the Grand Duke Alexis, the minister of marine and Gen. Ignatieff.

A dispatch received at New York says the Pacific Mail steamer Salvation is beached at Punta Arenas, Central America. Passengers and crew saved and cargo partially. But little hope of getting the vessel off.

Col. Honki Bey, aide-de-camp of the sultan, has gone to London to purchase torpedo boats. He was accompanied by two officers, who will make it their special business to learn to handle torpedoes and launchers.

Five iron-clads were kept in readiness at Constantinople last month to put to sea at a moment's notice for the purpose of carrying troops to Egypt, should the powers agree as to the necessity for Turkish intervention.

A Denberg dispatch of May 31 says: Yesterday the exodus of Jews from all parts of Russia commenced. As the foreign corn trade was almost entirely in Jewish hands the utmost confusion prevails in that industry.

James Mooney, president of the Irish National Land League of America, telegraphed Parnell from Buffalo, New York as follows: "In the name of the Irish National Land League of America I congratulate you and the Irish people on the destruction of coercion."

A Laramie dispatch of the 4th says: A wonderful discovery of native copper and silver ore, seventeen miles southeast of this place, has just been made, directly across the old overland stage road. The ore runs 60 to 100 per cent. copper, with gold and silver in paying quantities. Parties are stampeding to the new discovery from all directions.

Capt. Tod, of the British steamer Glamis Castle, which arrived in San Francisco on the 31st from China, states that there are between 80,000 and 90,000 Chinese at Hongkong awaiting an opportunity to come to this country, and vessels are being chartered at enormous rates. The fact that Chinese do not arrive by the thousands every day is because there are not sufficient vessels to be had to bring them over.

A Chicago dispatch of May 31 says: A Mrs. Lucas of this city, obtained possession of the Garfield memorial flowers to put them through a preservation process in work. She received pecuniary assistance from parties who arranged with her to show them around the country. Mrs. Garfield objected to this. The flowers were taken into the police court on a writ of replevin by parties who advanced the money a few days ago and turned over to Gen. Eldridge as custodian. Today the matter was compromised and the flowers will be sent to the Garfield Monument Association.

The new Pacific Mail steamer San Jose, launched a few days since, will be finished as rapidly as possible, as will also her sister ships, the San Juan and San Blas. These steamers will be got round to the Pacific inside of a year, or in time to take their place in the line before the next coffee season. Probably one of them will be kept on the Atlantic side. The City of Paris, sister ship to the City of Rio Janeiro, will be sent in her place, however. All these will make the trip to Aspinwall and back in order to give the ships now running on the line a chance to be overhauled, which is very much needed.

A New York dispatch of the 1st inst. says: Postmaster Pearson has no clue to the senders of the explosive packages to Vanderbilt Field. He will examine the collectors to-morrow. A little glass globe of fluid was taken out of the machine intended for Vanderbilt. He sent it to Prof. Ogden Doremus, who declared the fluid to be sulphuric acid, which, if brought in contact with gunpowder and chloride of potash, even in small quantities, will cause it to explode. The Tribune, in reviewing the attempt says: If a large body of conspirators, or any persons of intelligence, had been at the bottom of it they would, at least, have taken care the packages were correctly addressed. Moreover, a man with correspondence so large as Vanderbilt or Field has cannot take the trouble to open many of his letters, let alone packages.

The Times' New York special May 4th: Castle Garden is now undoubtedly the most interesting spot on Manhattan island. Since day break no fewer than six steamers have come in with a living freight of 6000 in all. In the crowd were a party of stalwart English brewers, fifty in number, who say they have come over to see if they cannot introduce Anglo-American ale to take the place of the popular German-American lager, and bring with them considerable capital, and the intention is to start an experimental brewery, probably in Philadelphia. They come from Preston, near Manchester, where they own brew houses. The steamer Steinman brings a numerous party of Dutch cattle raisers, destined for Stevens county, Texas, each of whom has an average capital of \$800 with which to go into business. They bring families with them. The Italia, from Gibraltar, brings about a thousand Italians, not a few of them railroad laborers. There is also reason for the belief that some of them come here to the padrones who pay their passage over with the understanding they will be rag-pickers and beggars, sharing their profits, but the authorities are determined to enquire into all such cases and send all such emigrants back.
