TAXATION ON MORTGAGES.

The subject of the taxation of mortgages in the counties in which they are recorded has lately elicited considerable discussion. The early opposition to such a law would come from a few capitalists, who loan their money and then escape payment of their just taxes.

The Democratic State Convention saw fit to adopt a resolution expressive of the views of the Democracy on the question. It is as follows: "That we favor the taxation of all mortgages in the counties where the same are recorded."

M. C. GEORGE is a pronounced advocate of high protective tariff. The farmers and laboring men of this State, who are taxed to support a few wealthy manufacturers in the East should remember him by their ballots on the 5th of June.

Mr. MOORE is taking a tour over the country to see the people. After the 5th of June his business in that dry goods store at the Dalles will require all of his attention.

W. D. FENTON favors a tariff for revenue only.

THE RECORD.

Republicans just now are anxious to have it admitted that there are no issues between the two parties. The vote of the Senate on the question of striking out that section of the Chinese bill, which prohibits the naturalization of Chinese by State or Federal Courts ought to convince any fair minded man that there is at least one important issue.

"SECTION 14.—That hereafter no State court or court of the United States shall admit Chinese to citizenship and all laws in conflict with this act are hereby repealed."

Our reader will do well to remember that on a vote to strike out the section which prohibits the naturalization of the Chinese, not a single Democrat voted for it, while 26 Republicans voted for such naturalization; and but five Republican Senators, all of whom belong to the Pacific Coast, except Cameron of Wisconsin, voted against naturalization, while 27 Democrats are recorded in opposition to it.

PRESIDENT ARTHUR has signed the Chinese bill as published in our columns last week. The act will become a law ninety days after its signature, or on August 4th. In the meantime every vessel that can be chartered is loading Chinese at Hong Kong for ports on this Coast, and it is estimated that 100,000 will be landed on our shores before the law becomes operative.

CHINESE to the number of 100,000 will be landed on the Pacific Coast before August 4th. It must be remembered that these figures represent male adults. That number of European male immigrants would represent a population of 400,000.

CHAIRMAN HIRSCH.

Sol. Hirsch is the Chairman of the Republican State Central Committee of this State. He is the man who cast his vote against the bill to reduce interest on money. He is the same Senator who left his chair, as President of the Senate, and proceeded on the floor of the Oregon Senate Chamber to denounce the bill for the interchange of freights, (Senate Bill No. 82) by common carriers, and together with Joe Simon, J. N. Dolph and others, succeeded in defeating the bill.

The Tariff on Wool.

The Republican State Convention in stating its protective tariff principles, specified the wool interest hoping thereby to catch a few Democratic votes in Wasco county. But Republican politicians will learn that Democratic wool growers cannot be caught with such chaff. The fact is that the tariff on wool does not benefit the wool grower of Oregon, for the reason that a good article of wool is always higher in England than it is in the United States and this, the Democratic wool grower of Eastern Oregon understands as well as Democrats elsewhere.

It is very cheeky on part of the Republican party to ask laboring men to support the policy of protection, which compels them to pay from one-third to one-half more for their goods to enrich the manufacturer, who employs cheap foreign labor in his factory to the exclusion of American laborers, who will not work for starvation wages.

Weaver, the Greenback candidate for President, is expected to open the campaign in Texas. There is still a lurking suspicion that Weaver is employed to work for the Republican party.
