

### O. P. R. R. Notes.

Yaquina Bay Post, June 7th. The new warehouse and docks are completed. Work on the "fill" just in the rear of the docks, is being pushed forward at a fair rate, and Supt. Boswell will soon have a space sufficienty large to construct machine shops and roundhouses thereon. Master Mechanic Roberts has constructed six dump cars, which are being used by the grading forces advantageously. He is now engaged in building twenty flat cars to form the "soon to be needed" construction trains. Graders are at work on the Wiser cut situated between the Co's docks and Oneatta. This is probably as deep if not the deepest cut on the road; being about sixty feet.

Last Wednesday on our way to this place, we visited one of the tunnels-No. 1. from the Bay. A large amount of dirt had to be removed before the tunnel proper commenced. We were informed by the bosses that the boreing into the mountain would begin in a day or two. Sandstone of a shelly nature makes the progress rather slow: Drilling the holes for blast in the stone is done by hand. The tunnels will be 16 feet wide by 22 feet high, and as a matter of course a large amount of rock and dirt will have to be removed. Dump cars are ready upon the ground to be used as the work progresses in the tunnel. It is the intention of the contractors to run three shifts of men eight hours each at both ends of the tunnel On the end of the work from Yaquina Bay we found a force of 36 chinamen and just over mountain, to the other side found 20 more, all the force that could be used to an advantage. We did not visit the tunnels near the Summit, as we came in on the little Elk road, thus leaving the tunnels several miles to the right, but learn that the work is progressing under very favorable circumstances.

### The Last Appeal Benied.

Chief Justice Carter and Judges James and Hagner, constituting court in banc, on the 5th, rendered a decision upon the last motion filed by Reed in Guiteau's behalf. The chief justice delivered the decision as follows: In the case of Guiteau the judges who listened to the argument in that case have concluded they have exhausted their powers upon it, that they have heard it patiently, fully and fairly, and that reargument would bring no other conclusion than that already arrived at, and they decline to reopen the case for argument.

Jail officials say it is a fact that becomes more apparent every day that Guiteau is failing mentally and physically. His condition yesterday was startling in the excreme, and forbodes a total smash up before the 30th. Certain signs of physical and mental disintegration is in the failure of a person's appetite in a case like this. Guiteau's appetite is failing, and he has become taciturn and uncommunicative since lawyer Reed's visit yesterday, and spends the entire time between rising and retiring lying stretched on his cot pondering perhaps on the few intervening days between life and death. He will surely fail before hanging day is the opinion of those who see and know him, and jail officials will have to carry him to the scaffold and prop him up until the fatal drop falls. Abject fear is taking possession of him and the assassin will present a pitiable appearance when the penalty is reached. Some are inclined to think he will go stark mad a few days prior to the event, and present indications surely point in that direction. One thing is certain, and that is, Guiteau will surely sink into abject fear, become seriously sick, or become wholly crazy before many days
