RAILWAY NEWS.

A telegraphic dispatch yesterday from Washington states that President Grant was long at 11:30 a. m. on that day. The president of President Grant has paid the penalty of his crime, and the law has been avenged.

Electric Railway to St. Catharines.

At present four daily trains are taken each way through the St. Catharines Tunnel, but even with this slight traffic congestion is a serious problem. It seems that the shortest route leading up to the great cut in the incline is so long that a locomotive is required at each end of the track, and the cost in charge of this run at the year have to be supplied with thousands of tons of fuel which is loaded. It is estimated that a new system must be adopted as soon as the completion of connecting lines makes the tunnel traffic heavy. With this in view, the chief engineer, Mr. Beidel, has sought the services of the Messrs. Siemens, who propose an electric railway similar to that adopted by them in Paris. There is an abundance of water power available entrance to the tunnel, and this will be utilized to drive turbines working the dynamo. A one-inch copper rail will be carried through the tunnel, in which a little current will run in electrical connection with the electro-motor on the train. Current will thus be supplied throughout the journey, the rails serving the purpose of a return wire. The expense of this experiment will be about 100,000 francs, but if it should not succeed the value of the plant will reduce the loss to 80,000 francs.

Homicide at Grove Creek.

The following are the facts concerning the killing of Win Fox by Henry Lane at Grove Creek, in Jackson county, last week: It appears that several men among whom were Lane and Fox, went to Nagle's school to take some liquor and while there engaged in a game of cards for money. A dispute soon arose and Fox abused Lane shamefully and offered to fight which was declined. Finally Fox became so abusive that Lane went into another room, procured a gun, loaded and leveled it at Fox, made him take back all he had said and agreed to quit quarreling. Fox then went off, Lane staying behind to do some trading and then started for Grove Creek about 7 o'clock in the evening. When about three hundred yards north of Nagle's he met Fox and two men named Brown and Little, and the quarrel was renewed. Little took the gun away from Lane when Fox stepped at him and both men fell. Little pulled Lane off, separating them, and Fox got up saying he was cut. Brown and Little then started to assist Fox to Nagle's house and he asked to be left alone, which was done. One of the men then started for Grove Creek to telephone for a doctor, and the other went for water, and when they returned they found Fox lying dead in the road. He was stabbed three times, although being sufficient to cause death. Lane made his escape, but has been seen in the neighborhood, and will be caught. Fox was a young man and Lane a soldier. Both were employed at the railroad tunnel near the scene of the homicide. Fox's body was at the bottom of the effort and shown another victim.

Family Matters.

It has been erroneously stated that a report favorable to local suffrage had been adopted by the Senate committee in connection with the consideration of one or more Democratic members. This is incorrect. The committee consisting of Messrs. Lapham, Blair, Perry and Anthony, Republicans, and Fair, Jackson and George, Democrats. The Democratic members are with unusual unanimity the re-appointment of their position, and will make in a minority report, which will not discuss the question of local suffrage, but take ground that it is a state question, and not one for national determination.

A bill before Congress, and likely soon to become a law, opens to commercial sections the full sections of railroad land allotted only to be held from the Government by purchase. The land allowed in each section is 160 acres, and if any one under previous laws has not been able to acquire that amount he is authorized to claim, whatever number of acres may be necessary to make it up, the residents and cultivators of land in the section, or if he had made any, he is considered as making good his claim in his new entry and it is to be deducted from five years' residence required by law.
