

An Army of Federal Officials.

From the S. F. Examiner.

From the "Official Register" of the United States for the year 1881 we give below some facts about the employees of the Government in California and their salaries, which may be of interest to our political readers. The "Blue Book," issued by the Government, is divided into the Legislative, Executive and Judicial branches. It contains 876 pages. It has an index of 103 pages of names, showing 39,552 persons in the branches before named, who draw their salaries from the United States Treasury. As we have nothing to do with parties outside of this State, we confine ourselves to California, and find in the Legislative branch six persons who draw \$36,000 per annum; in the Executive, fifteen hundred and one persons, who draw \$1,831,597 20; in the Judicial, ninety-seven persons, who draw \$14,060 per annum; or a grand total of 1604 persons, who receive yearly \$1,875,599, 20. This has nothing to do with the hundreds of Postoffices in California and the large number of employees in that service. Nor do we speak of the portion of the army stationed here, nor of the navy, or the flying squadrons of the Treasury and secret eyes of the various Departments that come and go. We are convinced that the word fees, which very frequently appears, and is a direct tax upon the pockets of the people, sends this enormous sum beyond two millions per annum. It may be interesting to segregate this sum, for a great deal of this money is uselessly thrown away; and we want to warn the public that in this book they will find the names of parties who receive salaries and really give no service therefor. Who wouldn't be a Government officer and help fix up the "Civil Service" for the purpose of keeping himself in a soft place? Let the reader figure up two per cent of this immense salary list, and he will get an idea of the enormous corruption fund that the Republicans are raising by political assessment.

The Boston Advertiser the ablest Republican newspaper in New England wants to know by what authority the Republican Congressional Committee levies assessments, and adds that "If the Republican party, which formerly had no trouble in getting votes honestly, is obliged to offer cash terms for states and individuals—and the assessment looks like it—it is time to make an assignment and retire from business." Which expression will meet with a wide and hearty response from thousands of Republicans, who believe that if the party cannot be kept in power except by the blackmailing of government employes it had better accept defeat.

Our valley members of the next Legislature should not forget to secure the passage of a bill providing for the construction of a fish ladder at the Willamette falls. Such a bill passed the last Legislature two years ago, but was vetoed by the Governor for the reason that funds for the construction of the work had not been provided in the appropriation bill. A fish ladder could be constructed at the falls at only a slight expense to the State, and the benefits which would accrue to the people of the Willamette Valley would be great.—Albany Democrat.

The Chinese restriction bill went into effect yesterday, and hereafter no Mongolians must land on our shores, except for the purposes of commerce and education. For the past few weeks quite a thriving business has been carried on in the coolie trade, and thousands have been landed in Oregon and California since the passage of the bill. The open question will soon be solved whether or not the Government intends to enforce the provisions of the bill.

The Cincinnati Enquirer thus heads a report of the seating of Swalls: "Unparalleled Republican Outrage—A Poor South Carolina Negro Condemned to Sit in the House—And Associate with Robeson, Keifer and their Gang."

It is claimed that the insane asylum will be ready to receive the insane of the state by the time the legislature meets. Where will the republican majority be then?—News.

The President vetoed the river and harbor appropriation bill, as surmised. The Senate and House passed it over his head by a large vote.

Earthquakes in 1881.

Two hundred and forty-four earthquakes, it is stated are known to have occurred during 1881, of which 86 were in winter, 61 in autumn, 56 in spring, and 41 in summer. The earthquake period at Agram, beginning in November, 1880, extended into 1881, in which earth vibrations were observed on twenty-four days, many of the shocks being very violent. Among the great earthquakes of 1881, that of Chaois takes the first place. The tremendous first shock in the afternoon of April 3d laid most of the town of Castro in ruins. This earthquake, lasting six days in full strength (with thirty or forty very violent shocks), was felt most in the southern part of the Island. On the main land, the port of Tachame was half destroyed. In Chaois, 4181 persons were killed and about 1,000 injured. From April 10th the phenomena gradually abated.

Boss Robeson is making himself generally obnoxious by personal attacks on some of his colleagues, and even his Republican brethren are tiring of him. The better class of Republicans in his congressional district have protested against his re-election and the chances for the retirement of this notorious corruptionist are good.

Hon. Robert E. Pattison, Democratic candidate for Governor of Pennsylvania is only thirty-one years of age, but is very popular with the people. He was elected City Comptroller of Philadelphia in 1878, and in 1880 was re-elected, running ahead of his ticket by more than 34,000 votes.

The Khedive has declared Arafbi Pasha to be a rebel and usurper. He has read Arabi out of the party and ordered all loyal Egyptians to refuse obedience to him. But somehow the Egyptians stick to Arabi and pay little attention to the Khedive. The alleged tail seems to wag the dog.

The tariff question is being closely sifted by Congress, and the deeper our representatives go in their investigations the more clearly can the laboring man see the great injustice he has been doing himself in allowing this protector of corporations to be in existence as long as it has been.
