U. S. Senator.

J. N. Dolph, of Portland, was elected U. S. Senator on the last ballot in the Legislature Friday Oct. 20th, receiving every Republican vote in that body with the exception of D. M. C. Gault, of Multnomah. How the celebrated "18" could vote for a man who is such a monopolist as this gentleman is, after refusing to vote for Mitchell on account of his intimacy with the railroads, is a mystery we cannot solve. Mr. Dolph is Vice President of the O. R. & N. Co., and O. & C. R. R., and is also a trustee and attorney of that great corporation, the N. P. R. R. We must therefore conclude that those who fought Mr. Mitchell to the last must have had some more "weightier names," i. e. wanting to fill some of the offices. We congratulate those Democratic members who refused to vote for anyone except a Democrat, while those Democrats who betrayed their constituents, we do not hesitate to denounce as renegades unworthy of the confidence of the people. We accept the issue. "Dolph for 1882 and Mitchell for 1884." This was the motto on the transparency carried in the procession which met Senator Mitchell at Portland one day last week. The Democrats of Oregon are prepared for the issue. THE apportionment bill failed to pass the Legislature. We suppose that that much needed measure will be reserved until the Democrats regain control of the Legislature before a fair bill will be introduced and passed. THE stalwart Mitchell papers are disgusted at the triumph of the "18," and vow vengeance on minorities in the future.
