If it Had Been a Presidential Election.

Throwing aside all questions of causes, and giving simply the facts with regard to heads of State tickets, it will be interesting to enquire what proportion of the electoral vote of the country is represented by the States carried last week by each party, remembering that the Electoral College will be composed of 401 members.

The States carried by the Democrats are as follows, with their respective electoral votes attached to each:

Alabama, 10; Arkansas, 7; California, 6; Connecticut, 6; Delaware, 3; Florida, 4; Georgia, 12; Indiana, 15; Kansas, 9; Kentucky, 13; Louisiana, 8; Maryland, 8; Massachusetts, 14; Michigan, 13; Mississippi, 3; Missouri, 16; Nevada, 3; New Jersey, 9; New York, 36; North Carolina, 11; Ohio, 23; Pennsylvania, 30; South Carolina, 9; Tennessee, 12; Texas, 13; Virginia, 12; West Virginia, 6; Wisconsin, 11—total electoral vote, 330.

The States carried by the Republicans were: Colorado, 3; Illinois, 22; Iowa, 13; Maine, 6; Minnesota, 7; Nebraska, 5; New Hampshire, 4; Oregon, 3; Rhode Island, 4; Vermont, 4—total electoral vote, 71.

Timber on Homesteads.

The following is the latest ruling in regard to cutting and disposing of timber on homesteads: Timber land embraced in a homestead, or other entry not consummated, may be cleared in order to cultivate the land and improve the premises, but for no other purpose. If, after clearing the land for cultivation, there remains more timber than is required for improvement, there is no objection to the settler disposing of the same. But the question whether the land is being cleared of its timber for legitimate purposes is a question of fact, which is liable to be raised at any time. If the timber is cut and removed for any other purposes it will subject the entry to cancellation, and the person who cut it will be liable to civil suit for recovery of the value of said timber, and also to criminal prosecution under section 2,461, of revised statutes.

The Democracy has a splendid opportunity before it. What is wanted is younger blood and brains to supercede the fossils that have attached themselves like barnacles to the party and will either rule or ruin. It is a party in the main that declares for tariff for revenue only, and it is to be hoped that no pronounced tariff man like Randall will be elevated to the Speakership.

The recent elections demonstrate that the people will not submit tamely to the robbery and corruption which has been practiced by the Republican administration. An exorbitant river and harbor bill, pension bill, two per cent. assessment, and a Stalwart Half-Breed fight, have prepared the country for a Democratic President in 1884.

The Republicans claim that there is no issue between the two great parties. The result of the recent elections will probably convince them that honesty and economy in the administration of National affairs has been made an issue.

The Match Tax.

Persons are frequently arrested for selling unstamped matches, and they are imprisoned as though they were criminals. It seems hard that boys who are following what should be an honest occupation, and trying to gain a living honestly, instead of becoming thieves, should be prevented from doing so. Three boys were brought over from Oakland lately and five persons from San Jose, all in trouble on this account. To us it seems that the parties really to blame are those who contrive such an odious law. It is an unfair and unequal way of collecting money, because the poor family which has little or no property needs as many matches as the wealthiest family in the land. The burden of government is thus unequally apportioned. The match tax is not needed, and never has been needed, for the million or two of dollars that it brings to the treasury yearly will be squandered or stolen by a wasteful and incompetent Administration. During the last session of Congress many millions were worse than wasted, merely to avoid reducing the national debt. There are parties interested in continuing the indebtedness of the Federal Government, and that is why several hundred millions more of it is not already paid. Politicians who waste the public treasures and then replace them by harsh and unpaid exactions from the people need branding with the people's execration.

The Hop Boom.

There is an evident disposition on the part of speculators to overdo the hop business. Last season's crop has been so profitable that people never stop to consider whether it was an exception or the rule. Four or five years ago hop cultivation was abandoned as unprofitable; now it is being rushed into without foresight. Nevertheless, on an average of years, hops will pay as well as any other crop, and if it happens that the English and Eastern harvest should fail in any season, prices would rule exceptionally high, as they have done this fall. In the northern coast counties of California, and in Oregon and Washington Territory, where water is abundant, hops flourish; but the crop cannot be grown everywhere. High prices are being paid for land suited for hop growing.

A Growing Youth.

Jean Condoist has been brought to Paris as a medical curiosity from the Haute Caone. According to a medical contributor to a Parisian contemporary, this youth, aged 19, took a start on the 17th of May, 1881, being then six feet three inches high, and found one morning that he had grown an inch. Every week since then he has registered himself, and on the 14th of September this human beanstalk had gained five inches; he grew five inches more before the 20th of January, 1882, and seven more before March 15, and he now stands 7 feet 10 inches. All this has been accompanied by great pains in the back, and he stoops considerably; but since last June, it is his legs only that have grown, and his feet are already twenty-four inches long.—Pall Mall Gazette.
