The Tariff Commission

Chicago Tribune (Rep.) When the people's representative at Washington last Winter shirked the tariff question by shuffling off on a commission, there was widespread dissatisfaction.

It is now announced that the forthcoming report of the commission will not recommend any changes in taxation beyond a slight increase on some duties and a slight decrease of others.

It cannot see any reason why the mountainous burden of tariff taxation should be lifted, or why American industries should be protected by giving them the raw materials free of tax.

One of the largest iron manufacturers in this county testifies distinctly to the commission that the taxes on imported iron ores were a restriction of American manufacturing.
