

Domesticating the Partridge.

[Catekill Examines.]

We believe that the partridge can be domesticated. An attempt was made some years ago on Long Island, which was partially successful. In severe winters at the West, during heavy snow storms, they have been known to approach granaries and barns, and to feed in common with poultry. We had, several years past, a somewhat singular experience with a single specimen of this shy bird, which may be worth relating, as it is a strong proof of the possibility of their domestication. One evening we found a full grown partridge under some currant bushes. It was a strong, fine bird, and did not seem afraid, although after the habit of its kind, it was quite watchful. We easily captured it by hand and caged it, but its efforts to release itself were so severe that we resolved to give it its liberty. Strange to say, it seemed grateful, and allowed quiet handling. We had several broods of young chickens, and at feeding time it regularly appeared among them for its portion of food. At night it made its home on a low grape trellis, and on occasion of anyone passing beneath it would make a slight noise and would permit a touch of the hand. A bit of red color in a dress or in any other shape always seemed to excite it, and it would chase the children up and down the garden walk as long as the offensive color was displayed. As cold weather approached the bird sought warmer shelter and found a roosting place in the chicken-house very near the fowls. He had remained with us nearly the entire summer and suddenly disappeared, the probability being that he was stolen.

What Trains are Worth.

But few persons, as they see one of the fast express trains flit by, are aware of the value of such a train. What is known as the royal limited express over the Pennsylvania road, as the train is ordinarily made up, represents over \$120,000, as follows: Engine, \$12,000; baggage car, \$1,200; smoking car, \$5,000; dining room car, \$12,000; five elegant Pullman cars, \$18,000 each, \$90,000. While this may seem to be an exception, the ordinary express trains represent \$83,000 to \$85,000. The engine and tender, which are considered together, valued at \$10,500; baggage car, \$1,000; the postal car, \$2,000; the smoking car, \$5,000; the two ordinary passenger cars, \$10,000 each; and three palace cars, \$15,000, are in many cases worth \$18,000, and some Pullman cars are now run which cost in the neighborhood of \$30,000.

It is stated that the average value of a freight train is still greater than a passenger train, when the rolling stock and value of property carried are included. Sometimes the freight on one of these through trains aggregates in value \$250,000 to \$300,000, and what is a little singular is the fact that the trains moving westward are more valuable than those moving eastward; a large per cent. of the West bound business is merchandise or valuable machinery, while nearly 75 per cent. of the East bound business is grain, which is carried in a car costing \$450, and the property carried will average \$400 per car, so that the entire train of 25 cars, engine included, are not worth over \$34,000 or \$35,000.
