CAUSTIC FOX.

The New York Congressman Speaks in Favor of American Shipping.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—Yesterday Cox delivered a lengthy speech in behalf of the bill favoring the organization of the Departments of Commerce and Navigation. After detailing the laws of navigation, he said that, amid a derided marine dominion, in which one power alone has half the rule of the ocean, American shipping interests sit a scepterless and forlorn, dethroned, ignoble, dispirited and disgraced symbol of our nationality. Mr. Cox here quoted from a recent speech by the English Premier:

"My boyhood was spent at the mouth of the Mersey, and in those days I used to see those beautiful American liners which conducted the bulk and the pick of the trade between the two countries. At that time the Americans were deemed to be so entirely superior to us in ship-building and navigation that they had four-fifths of the whole trade between the two countries in their hands, and that four-fifths was the best of the trade. Nothing but the dogs were left in comparison for the one-fifth of British shipping. What is the case now? Our free trade has operated and applied the stimulus to the intelligence of Englishmen, and on the other hand the action of Americans has been restrained by the tightening of their protective system. Now the scales are exactly reversed. Instead of America doing four-fifths of the business, and that the best, the Americans pick up, if I may say so, the leavings of the British, and transact the residue of the business, not because they are inferior to us in energy—it would be a fatal error to suppose so—not because they are less enlightened or less deserving. They are your descendants, your kinsmen, and fully equal to you in human energy and power."

We welcome every race to our shores in vessels of other nations. Our enormous surplus, which feeds the world, is for others to bear away. We gaze at the leviathans of commerce entering our harbors and darkening our sky with pinnions of smoke; but the thunder of the engines is under another flag and the shouting of captains is in an alien tongue. Others distribute produce, capitalize money, gather glories and elevate their institutions by the amenities and benignities of our commerce; and our boasting of our invention, heroism and freedom, and we allow the jailers of hatred and selfish policy to place gyces upon our energy and impression, our genius in sight of these splendid achievements. Mr. Speaker, if you would that we should once more fly your own ensign upon the sea, assist us to take off the burdens from our navigation, and give to us first, last and best, the indispensable conception of civilization by commerce.

Oregon Advertising Rates.

There is an impression in Oregon that the advertising rates charged are out of all reason, and higher than elsewhere, when just the reverse is the case. It was but the other day that a restaurant man, who knew "Jim Bennett, and was a New Yorker himself," had the audacity to tell our advertising solicitor that he could get a column in the New York Herald for a month for less than the Sunday Welcome asked for the same space and time. Of course this voracious caterer must be able to get special rates on account of his acquaintance with "Jim," for at the regular prices the New York Herald's cheapest column for a year is \$39,720, and its highest \$348,000,—worth, in fact, almost as much as the restaurant's feeding establishment. Oregonians get their advertising very cheaply, and they ought to take more advantage of the fact. A column in the Chicago Tribune for a year costs \$26,000, and the lowest column in the New York Tribune for that time demands \$29,064, while the highest readily brings \$85,648. One column for one year at such a price, and the Welcome editor would throw a shadow over this community for all time, by retiring from journalism.—Portland Welcome.

The reports of the Senatorial contest in Michigan between Hubbell and Ferry are more or less conflicting, but it seems now to be pretty well agreed upon that neither Ferry nor Hubbell will be elected. Several new candidates have entered the field. Among them is James F. Joy, who made the speech nominating Blaine in the Chicago convention of 1880.

Bill for Improvement of Northwest Pacific Coast and Rivers.

George, of Oregon, introduced a bill Jan. 9th asking for the following appropriations for the northwest Pacific coast, principally in accordance with the estimate of the engineers in charge: For the permanent improvement of the mouth of the Columbia river, \$500,000; additional appropriation for the harbor of refuge at Port Orford, \$450,000; locks at the Cascades, \$50,000; lower Willamette and Columbia rivers from Portland to the sea, \$125,000; Coos bay, \$75,000; Yaquina bay, \$140,000; Columbia and Snake rivers, \$56,000; Coquille, upper Willamette and Yamhill, \$51,000; Umpqua river, \$12,000; Cowlitz river, \$30,000; Young's river, \$10,000; Lewis river, \$250; Siuslaw river, \$1500; Tillamook, survey, \$1500; Alsea river, \$2500.

If a high tariff will make the wages of the laborer higher, then there ought to be content in the houses of American manufacturing hands, because this country has been under the operations of the highest tariff in history for twenty long years. On the other hand, it is a fact that there have been more labor riots and more suffering among laborers in this country during the years mentioned than ever was known before. The factory lords may get the shekels—the laborers have not seen them in abundance.

ADDITIONAL LOCALS.

From the Railroad Front.

[Jacksonville Times.]

Having just completed a tour around the big bend of Cow creek, I am able to give you some railroad news. The track is now laid to the west fork of Cow creek, 24 miles beyond Riddle. Louisville is now nearly deserted, and the crowd of gamblers and thieves congregated at camp 8, about 16 miles on the other side of Louisville. The railroad company has opened a gravel pit four miles north of Louisville, and the construction work is being engaged in hauling gravel and ballasting the road south of Riddle. There are about a thousand Chinamen employed on the road as far as the track has been laid, removing slides, grading, etc. Tunnel No. 1 is completed, being the shortest of the seven tunnels in the Cow creek canyon. It is 189 feet through, and filled with heavy timbers throughout. Tunnel No. 2 will be 320 feet in length and completed in three weeks. No. 3 is 22 miles south of Riddle, 516 feet in length when completed, most of which will have to be timbered and cannot be completed before the middle of March. At the present terminus the road crosses the west fork, requiring a bridge of 155 feet span, it being already completed and ready for the rails. At camp 8 the road crosses Cow creek. The bridge at this place has a span of 161 feet between the main piers, and it will take about four weeks to complete it. Tunnels three and four are about 30 miles south of Riddle, the former being 321 feet long, and the latter 459 feet long. They will be completed about the first of April. No. 5 is the largest of the tunnels in the canyon and will be 614 feet in length, 214 feet long completed. It will take at least three months to finish the remainder. Tunnel No. 7 has a cut of 400 feet and will be finished by the time the track can be laid that far. These tunnels are worked from both ends day and night, Sundays not excepted. Three shifts of hands are employed and the work never stops. There is no grading of account down south of camp 8, 15 miles below the big tunnel. From all appearances the road cannot be completed to the big tunnel before the first of July. The road follows the right bank of Cow creek to a point about two miles below this tunnel, where it crosses to the left bank. Besides the bridge at this point, there is trestle work for nearly three-quarters of a mile completed. The big tunnel will be 2,800 feet through and cannot be completed before next fall. The passenger and freight trains will probably run to the big tunnel next August. The superintendent of construction, Mr. Harris, and his assistant, Mr. Stephens, are railroad men of experience and are pushing the work to the utmost of their ability. The main portion of the grading will probably be done in Rogue river valley next summer.
