

**"Who Struck Billy Patterson?"**

William Patterson was a very wealthy tradesman of Baltimore. In the early days of this part of Georgia he bought up a great many tracts of land in Franklin county, and spent a good portion of his time in looking after his interests there. He was said to be as strong as a bear and as brave as a lion, but, like all brave men, he was a lover of peace, and, indeed, a good, pious man. Nevertheless, his wrath could be excited to a fighting pitch. On one occasion he attended a public gathering in the lower part of Franklin county, at some district court ground. During the day two opposing bullies and their friends raised a row, and a general fight was the consequence. At the beginning of the affray, and before the fighting began, Billy Patterson ran in the crowd to persuade them not to fight, but to make peace and be friends. But his efforts for peace were unavailing, and, while making them, some of the crowd in the general melee struck Billy Patterson a severe blow from behind. Billy at once became fighting mad, and cried out at the top of his voice, "Who struck Billy Patterson?" No one could or would tell him who was the guilty party. He then proposed to give any man \$100 who would tell him who was the guilty party. From \$100 he rose to \$1,000, but not \$1,000 would induce any man to tell him "who struck Billy Patterson." Years afterward, in his will, he related the above facts, and bequeathed \$1,000 to be paid by his executors to the man who would tell "who struck Billy Patterson." His will is recorded in the Ordinary's office at Carnesville, and any one curious about the matter can there find it and verify the preceding statement.—Carnesville Register.

**Bad Practice.**

If all we hear is true, says the Roseburg Plaindealer, of the management of affairs at the railroad front on the southern extension in reference to shielding men guilty of crime, things certainly have arrived at a sad state of affairs. Surprise need be no longer expressed, when men who have a little money on their persons are never heard of, and their bodies never found, and hence are reported lost. We were informed this week that certain parties high in authority at the front were harboring, shielding and aiding those charged with crime to seclude themselves from view of those who come out there clothed with the authority of a warrant for the arrest of these violators of the law. In consequence, no arrest can be effected, and the guilty parties are permitted to go unpunished, and are simply encouraged to delve down deeper into the pools of crime. Under such a state of affairs there can be no security of life nor property, and the very men who are now allowed to go unmolested may turn against the interests of those now shielding them.

**A POET TALKING POLITICS.**—Washington, Feb. 19th.—Joakin Miller, in an article on "President-Making," published here yesterday, says he has heard two names mentioned for Vice President since he has been in this city. He then goes on to say: "But here are the names; issue them to the people—George William Curtis and General John F. Miller, the Senator from California. I, as one of the people, name them as I heard them named. I have never seen Mr. Curtis. Personally I think he is not my friend. I am certain he will not be my friend after he reads this. But then, be it remembered, that I am only putting down what others said—a reporter of an honest expression of the people and their scribe. As for my cousin, John F. Miller, who stepped from citizen to Senator, I think he would prefer to still chase the sable seals of Alaska. Certain it is that I have never heard of this thing hinted at by either him or his friends, and I have only his proof to expect for this brief chronicle; but I am sorry he is a Republican."

**THE WHITMAN MONUMENT.**—The contract for the erection of a monument to the memory of Dr. Marcus Whitman has been let to Harkin & Patterson, of Portland, for the sum of \$11,150, the contractors throwing off \$100 of the original price. The monument is to be of granite, 32 feet high, and will take 110 tons. Work is to commence at once. On one side will be the inscription: "In memory of Marcus Whitman and his associate dead." Above the inscription will be an open bible, with the words: "Thy word, oh God, endureth forever." At the top will be an eagle with spread wings.
