OREGON AND WASHINGTON.

The school trustees at New Tacoma have decided to build a \$10,000 school house this summer.

There has been 10,143 tons of coal shipped from Carkon Hill, W. T. The production is rapidly increasing.

There is considerable corn being planted in the neighborhood of Huntsville, W. T. A good corn "pone" would recall days gone by.

As Mr. G. E. Myers and wife, who had been married but a few hours, were riding along, their team collided with another wagon, throwing out Mrs. M., who had her arm broken. She was taken to Spokane and had the arm set.

Mr. H. N. Muzzy, who lives near Spokane Falls, fired both barrels of a shotgun at some brants without roosting his artillery against his shoulder. The piece rebounded, split one thumb, nearly destroyed one eye, split his eye, and in fact used him as rough as a Kansas cyclone would. He is now nursing his wounds.

Astorian: The work of driving the piling for the foundation of Kinney's brick building on Squemoqua street has begun. It will be 50x70, two stories high, and will cost about \$17,000. On the other side of Genevieve street work is progressing on Captain Flavel's new building, which will be also 50x70 feet. A building of the same dimensions will be erected on the southwest corner of Genevieve and Chenamus streets. There are over fifty new buildings now in every stage of completion in Astoria.

Mr. J. H. Lister visited the Carbonado and Wilkinson coal mines on Monday, and having been somewhat familiar with coal mining operations in England, was an intelligent visitor. He was much impressed with the extent of the mines at Carbonado, the vast deposits of coal, (the veins ranging from 12 to 24 feet in thickness,) and the remarkable facilities employed for working and handling the product. There are now employed in and about these mines some 400 men, who take out 500 tons daily, which is to be increased to an out-put of 1,000 a day when the new machinery, recently received from San Francisco, is in position. The coal is hauled up on an incline of 900 feet in small cars by a stationary engine, connected with a steel wire cable.

A distinguished Ohio Republican says to a Cincinnati News correspondent: A million dollars can't save either Indiana or Ohio in 1884 to the Republicans, and it is altogether out of the question to talk about recovering New York. We are to have a Democratic administration sure. I honestly and candidly believe Ohio will go Democratic in 1884, and I gather my conclusions from observations of facts and the most reliable information, as it comes to me from people in different parts of the State. Republicans are losing strength rapidly. The reason there was not a full Republican vote last October was because there was just so many Republicans who would not swallow the status of the Republican national party, and they thought the rebels should begin there. Those men will vote in 1884, but they will vote the Democratic ticket, and they will have large accessions to their views.

The subject of the possibilities of navigation of Hudson bay and the development of the vast region of country accessible therefrom is attracting attention in Canada. Professor Bell of the dominion geological survey, says the bay is navigable six months in the year and that Hudson's straits present no serious obstacles. By building a railroad from Winnipeg to the head of navigation on Nelson river, the wheat of Manitoba might be shipped to Europe by the Hudson bay route the same year that it is harvested, and a great saving made on the present cost of transportation by the St. Lawrence route. Prof. Bell further says the wheat country extends 1300 miles north of Winnipeg, so that, it may be seen, the territory which can be devoted to grain-growing in those northern latitudes is one of immense area. Although population has poured into Manitoba at a rapid rate during the last five years, it will be several generations before the grain-fields are carried as far north as Saskatchewan.

Nine hundred head of young cattle were purchased at and near Lewisburg, Ia., by some Portland men for beef at \$25 per head. That is going a long way for beef.
