Getting Their Work In.

The attempt on part of Republicans

to foist Sam Randall with his incidental protection theory upon the Democratic party, as a candidate for the Presidency, must be costing them & deal of money. It begins to look as if a number of Democratic papers had bren subsidized, and while we have no fears that Randall will stand a ghost of a show for the nomination, we are certain that the Republican politicians are getting their work in on unsuspecting Democrats by making his campaign and pernicious incidental protection theory popular with a considerable faction of the Democratic party. So that when the Republican party occupies that position in the next campaign, it can hope to draw largely from Democrats who have been induced to endorse this innovation on their party principles. It always has been the platform theory of the Republicans, and it will be an easy matter for Republican pollticians to satisfy those who are committed to protection in any degree, that that party is the best representiive of the doctrine in any of its degrees or phases.
