BOARD OF REGENTS.

The University Chapel to be Cut up into Small Rooms.

The Board of Regents met at 7 o'clock, p. m., Thursday, June 14, 1883, and the following officers and regents were present: Hon. Matthew P. Deady, President; Joshua J. Walton, Jr., Secretary, and Hon. R. S. Bean, Hon. T. G. Hendricks, Hon. Rodney Scott, and Dr. S. Hamilton. Absent: Hon. Henry Failing, A. Bush and L. L. McArthur.

The executive committee made a report recommending that the auditorium be cut up for class rooms and library rooms. The matter of partitioning the auditorium was referred to the executive committee, with instructions to make the needed improvement.

The Faculty made a report recommending the names of the graduating class of 1883, and the degree of Bachelor of Arts was conferred on De Etta Cogswell, Samuel E. McClure, J. N. Goltra and W. T. Slater, and the Degree of Science was conferred on Emma Cornelius, Mary Parris, A. E. Dunn, T. C. Judkins, E. E. Lockwood, L. L. Spencer, M. E. Porter, C. L. Walker, A. C. Woodcock, Anna Pengra, E. L. Spencer, Wallace Mount.

And also certificates of graduation were granted to the following Normal Class: Alice Parish, Anna Bushnell, C. S. Calef, Sarah Chrisman, Nettie Denny, A. J. Hackett, O. P. McFall, L. Taylor and H. H. Hendricks.

Prof. Chas. Lambert was continued in the chair of English Literature, and E. E. Berke was continued as tutor with a salary of \$1,000 per annum.

A. G. Hovey, of the Lane Co. Banking Co. was elected Treasurer of the Board.

The following by-law was adopted: "That if any Professor or teacher of the University shall become a candidate for any public office, or for a nomination thereto, or be a delegate to any political convention or publicly seek a nomination thereto he shall be taken and considered as having resigned his position as such professor or teacher, as the case may be.
