County Fair.

For some time past the people of Cottage Grove have been looking forward to the twenty-fourth and fifth days of this month, at which time the Agricultural fair was to take place. The morning of the twenty-fourth opened with heavy rain showers, and but few persons were to be seen about the streets. By 10 o'clock however some stiff was manifested and the Agricultural hall, which heretofore had been empty, began to fill with exhibitors ready to place their products in position to show off to the best advantage, and by 1 o'clock the entire hall was tastefully adorned with fruits, flowers, vegetables and specimens of ladies fancy work, a more minute description of which will be given further on. The heavy rain of the morning had kept the farmers and those from neighboring towns, who had anticipated attending the fair, at home, but with the breaking away of the clouds at noon came the rush to town, and by 2 o'clock Cottage Grove was crowded with people from all parts of the county. The race track was in poor condition for testing the speed of the race horses, and those having valuable stock would not allow it to go on the track. One running race was called however, and John Keeney and Al Montgomery took their positions on the track; Keeney riding a ditto and Montgomery a bright bay gelding. The two horses got an even start at the first trial and flew down the first quarter at a 2:40 gate. On the second quarter the ditto gained almost a full length, both horses doing some good running. As they entered the third quarter the bay gained rapidly on the ditto and seemed in a fair way to win the first heat, but as the horses were nearing the home stretch a calf, which had heretofore been unnoticed, "just a common calf," made its appearance. It started down the track at a good speed but was overtaken, the bay rode by while Montgomery attempted to jump it but failed, then "Man and horse and mud and air, in wild confusion mingled there."

Some say that Montgomery intended changing animals at this point and had concealed the calf there for that purpose; this, however, is a mere rumor. No time was called and the judges ordered all bets withdrawn. This closed the races for the day, except a trial trip made by Joseph Kennedy on a fiery untamed mustang, which bucked at such a furious rate that the rider gave up the job at the fence over which the horse tried to throw him.

SCARLET FEVER.—The scarlet fever is raging in the family of Mr W T Walker, near Goshen. Last week a son died, and one day this week Mr Walker and two of his grand children died of the dread disease. Five more of the family are lying very ill, and their recovery is doubtful. The disease is supposed to have been contracted from a cloak unpacked from the trunk used by Miss Martha Walker, who died at the residence of Prof Johnson last June, of scarlet fever. The family have the sympathy of the entire neighborhood in their sad affliction.

The Siuslaw Fair.

Crow, Lane Co., Or., Oct. 18, 1883.

EDITOR GUARD:—The Siuslaw Agricultural Society held their Fifth Annual Fair, on Wednesday, Oct 17th. A large crowd was in attendance. Hon H E Hayes, of Clackamas county, delivered the annual address, which was heartily received. In his address he declared the exhibit of vegetables was superior to those on exhibition at the State Fair. Beets a foot and a half long and eight inches in diameter; turnips as large as a water bucket and weighing 42 pounds, raised by Ansel Hemmings; potatoes, early rose, 4 lbs, snow flake 3 1/2 lbs, leopard 3 lbs; corn, 10 varieties, some as large as ever grew in the prairie State of Illinois; needle work more gorgeous than the far famed East; canned fruits—currants, blackberries, raspberries, gooseberries, elderberries; peaches, pears, cherries and grapes; apples as fine and large as any that ever grew in the far famed Willamette valley; pears, peaches, quinces and grapes, the latter as fine as any that are raised in California; flowers as fine as ever bloomed; wheat that will compare with Mr Geo Belshaw's best; oats surprised by none in the State; tomatoes from the size of a cherry up to larger than your double fists, and very fine flavor; timothy seed mesquite of the best quality; pumpkins two feet long and a foot thick; very fine squashes; grasses—timothy, millet, Hungarian and canary; cabbage, flat dutch, that weighed 40 lbs; carrots 20 inches long; beans of every color, size and shape—20 varieties; peas, 10 kinds. The fine arts were well represented.

Mrs S J Nighwander had 82 different articles on exhibition and took the \$1 premium for the same. Pet Douglas, eleven years old, took the 50 cent premium for the best pumpkin pie; Maggie Osmont, 10 years old, received the 50 cent premium for a pair of knit socks. There was some fine stock present but as there was no competition it was not entered for a premium. Last, but not least, there was four stag hound pups on exhibition, good for varnits or any kind of game. The editor of the Harrisburg Disseminator had a reporter on the grounds taking notes, so our fair will receive a good puffing.
