The Game Law.

During the past week we have received many inquiries concerning the game law, in relation to the killing of deer, therefore we publish the section referring to the protection of deer as passed by the Legislature at its session in 1882:

SECTION 1. Every person who shall with in the State of Oregon, between the 1st day of November in each year and the let day of July of the following year, hunt, pursue, take, kill or destroy any male deer or buck, shall be guilty of a misdemsanor. Every person who shall, between the lat of Jaonary and the let of Angust pursue, hunt, take, kill or destroy any femule deer or doe, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Every person who, after the passage of this act, shall kill any spotted fawn, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Every person who, after the passage of this act, sha'l take, kill or distroy any male or female deer at any time, unless the carmes of such animal is used or preserved by the person slaying it, or is sold for food, is guilty of a misdemeanor.
