A Murderer Killed

furnishes the following interesting particulars about this terrible affair: T J Matlock, Esq. who returned on Saturday last from a trip to the front on the O & C railroad, says that on Monday, the 19th of the present month, a party of men were engaged playing cards at Grant's Pass, which is in Josephine county, about three miles from the end of the track. A man by the name of Maloney and another by the name of Thompson, who is a notoriou gambler, got into a dispute and scuffle about the game, when Majoney drew a small knife with which he stabbed Thompson in the grion, but only inflicted a slight wound. Thompson then turned round and shot Maloney, killing him instantly. The murderer and some of his accomplices then got onto horses and drove about 40 miles into the mountains. There they got into a hut and barricaded it as well as they could Sheriff Purdom, of Douglas county, hearing of the murder and getting on the trail of the desperate gang followed them up, and getting into the vicinity, got an old soman to go to Thompson, and under the guise of friendship, persuade him to go to what she would call a safer place. She did so and him to throw up his hands. He told them to shoot and be ---, and at the same time he put a folded blanket up as a shield for his breast. At the same time he flourished a pistol in each hand. The Sheriff fired and missed Thomp son. One of the posse took better aim and fired, the shot taking effect in his back near the shoulders. Thompson, with an oath, shouted to them to shoot again. The second shot was fired, which took effect lower down, and the murderer fell forward and died.
