Seattle Water Works.

John Leary, manager of the Spring Water Company, has succeeded in San Francisco in raising money to increase the paid up stock of this company to \$250,000, says the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, and it has been determined to introduce water at once from Lake Washington. A stone and brick building will be erected on the west shore of the lake for the pumping machinery, from which a 15 inch pipe will extend into the lake a hundred yards or more, taking the water sixteen feet below the surface. The pumping capacity will be 1,500,000 gallons daily. The water will be forced from the lake to a reservoir of 5,000,000 gallons capacity, built midway between the sound and lake at an elevation above the sea of 315 feet, which will supply a greater part of the city's present population, but in order to supply all, an engine will be placed at the reservoir and made to pump into another reservoir 425 feet high, located on the Renton track, where the greatest altitude within the limits of the city is to be obtained. Some \$85,000 was expended last Summer in utilizing springs on the side hills in the southern part of town, and in six, eight, ten and twelve inch iron pipes leading to various parts of town, but the supply was found inadequate.

OREGON AND WASHINGTON.

All rail between Tacoma and Seattle Dec. 10.

After the fire in Victoria, B. C., the Chinese presented the fire department with the sum of \$300 and a gold medal to the chief.

Twenty-four men were discharged from the railroad shops, says the Tacoma Ledger, in consequence of an order received from W. T. Small, assistant superintendent of machinery and motive power for the western division. Only forty-five men are now employed at the shops.

Mr. Schuey, an employe of Benj. Despain, of Pilot Rock, was found lying in the road between that place and Pendleton on Monday with his leg broken, says the Walla Walla Union. Schuey says that he went to put the break on his wagon when his foot slipped, throwing him from the wagon.

The Indian school on the Puyallup reservation is in a flourishing condition. It now has an enrollment of sixty-five pupils, all of whom are making fair progress in their studies. Miss Susie Sanders has been employed as assistant teacher in place of Mrs. G. W. Bell, who was forced to resign on account of ill health.

The McMinnville correspondent of the Lafayette, Oregon, Register, says: The old Baptist college is no more; but it will still live in the memory of the students who once called it their home—their Alma Mater, and when "in dreams they revisit" the scenes of their youth and happy days at school, the old building, though down in the dust and forgotten, will ever be to memory dear.

That despicable, whining traitor, Mahone has commenced the interviewing "racket." He complains that the administration did not "support" him.
