### The Cosur d'Alena Mines.

It is 100 miles in length by 20 to 30 in width. A CRUEL HOAX.—United States District IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF Attorney Watson is making inquiries with a OREGION, you are hereby cited and re-Attorney Watson is making inquiries with a view of ascertaining who it was that forged his name to a letter, and played a cruel hoax on W N Griffin of Lane county. Mr Griffin, who is an old man, was summoned to appear as a witness in a trial in the United States Court concerning some trespasses on government land. Through missing a train he was unable to get here. Some one wrote him a letter, signing Judge Watson's name to it, stating that he had been fined \$5,000 for failing to appear, and that unless he paid it he would have to go to the penitentiary fer five years. This letter caused Mr Griffin and his family great distress, and his daughter wrote a touching letter to Judge Watson appealing for mercy.
