Richness of the Coeur d'Alene Mines.

The Palouse Boomerang says: Josiah Bishop has just returned from the new diggings. He has been there for several months, and has had ample opportunity to investigate the many reports, and from actual knowledge can give reliable information concerning the camp. He says there is no doubt but the rich ground extends over a large extent of country, the richest not yet discovered. All the creeks and side gulches give good prospects.

Quartz ledges have been struck that are "lousy with gold." But little prospecting for quartz has been done, owing to the fact that the eighteen inches deep on the hills. The claim owners have held a meeting and passed a law of June.

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It is probable that injunction suits, forcible entry and detainer squabbles and post mortem examinations will occupy the time of miners next Summer.

WORK ON THE OREGON PACIFIC RESUMED.

Tuesday morning work on the Oregon Pacific Railroad, which was suspended about four months ago, was resumed, and 300 Chinamen sent to Corvallis, from this city, were put to work at tunnels. Operations will be pushed under the direction of R. White, general superintendent, who recently arrived from New York. Where the money comes from to prosecute the work, is not known. The company was out of funds when work was suspended. The impression prevails that the Oregon Pacific is being backed by the Oregon Short Line, who wants an independent outlet to the Pacific Coast. It is reported that they have several surveying parties in the Minto pass of the Cascade mountains. Status of the work at this time is as follows: Of the forty-five miles to be graded between Corvallis and tide-water on Yaquina bay, seventeen miles has been graded on the eastern end and two miles on the western end; tunnel No 1, near the summit, 700 feet long, is in about 300 feet; tunnel No 2, 600 feet long, is perforated a distance of 200 feet; and tunnel No 650 feet long, a distance of 450 feet.—Oregonian.

REBATE ON TOBACCO.

According to the provisions of the law of Congress reducing the tax on manufactured tobacco which went into effect last May, dealers were allowed a rebate on the stock on hand at that date, provided they made application in due form. About all of them have done so and the Internal Revenue Commissioner in his report recommends the appropriation of the total amount to reimburse the claimants. This is the latest information received at the office of the Revenue Collector of this district, and the claimants shall be notified through the newspapers when and where they can get the money due them. The following is the whole number of claims presented: 46,859; amount of rebate claimed \$3,725,913 97; number of claims allowed 43,729; returned for correction 3,074; rejected 56; amount of claims paid \$3,524,167 22; rejected \$1,787; manufacturers 846; amount \$137,576 94; dealers 46,013; amount \$3,588,817 03; all the claims of manufacturers were allowed; 482 claims were put in from Oregon; amount \$49,132 24; two claims not allowed, amount \$118 10; Washington Territory 225 claims; amount \$15,191 85; disallowed 11; amount \$903 82.

COEUR D'ALENE MINES.

The appended items are late arrivals from the new mines: The new trail to the Coeur d'Alene from Haron Sliding is finished. It is reported almost impassable. There is but one mule in the Coeur d'Alene country and the owner of the animal demands \$15 a day for him. Quartz prospecting has ceased. Every foot of ground in Pritchard Gulch is taken up. Eagle City is being built at a lively rate. There are five saloons and a stud horse game in each one of them. Many men are going into the new camp daily, and almost as many leaving. Such is the location of Eagle City that the sun disappears from sight at noon daily.—Spokane Falls Review.
