**The Coeur d'Alene Mines.**  
 [From the Portland Telegram.]  
 Having just returned from the Coeur d'Alene mines, and meeting so many who are anxious to learn the facts regarding this latest find, I have concluded to give you a plain statement of the situation and some information which may be of great value to those intending to go there. Having no interests there at present, I think I can, without prejudice, give as clear a statement and come as near the facts regarding these gold fields as could be desired by the public. I shall, I think, come nearer to the facts than those who are interested in "booming" the mines. They are situated on Pritchard and Eagle creeks, which are about seventy-five miles above the mouth of the north fork of Coeur d'Alene river. Eagle creek empties into Pritchard creek about four miles above where the latter stream joins the river. At the junction of Eagle and Pritchard creeks is situated Eagle City, the largest city in the mines. About one and a half miles above on Pritchard creek is being located the town of Lansing. This is only 110 miles from Rathdrum, on the N. P. railroad. At present the only practicable route to the mines is via Rathdrum to the military post on Coeur d'Alene lake, which is twelve miles from Rathdrum, thence by steamer to what is known as the Mission, distance from the post 53 miles. From the Mission to the diggings, 45 miles, must be made with pack animals or by small boats up the river. The pack trains have all ceased operations, however, since the heavy fall of snow, and the men running the boats seem to think it their duty to fleece a traveler out of every cent he has for passage money. Some who attempted to keep up packing operations lost their animals. From the Mission to the mines one has to cross the river some twenty-eight times; therefore it is utterly impossible and foolhardy to attempt to pack in afoot. The Indians conduct most of the pack trains, charging enormous prices, and since the heavy fall of snow have left for the valleys, and refuse to attempt further operations as any price, although they could get fabulous prices to continue. The route by the old Mullen road, then by trail over the mountains, is closed for the Winter, there being about seven feet of snow on the trail when I left there. Great indignation is felt throughout the camp toward interested parties who have published statements claiming that the mines could be reached from Heron Siding. Some few managed to get in by that route, but it has been closed by snow for weeks. To those who seem to be disposed to rush off immediately to the mines, I would give this advice: "Stay where you are till Spring." The last of March or April is soon enough to start. At that time at least two light draft steamers (which are now under construction) will be plying on Coeur d'Alene lake. These boats will run 42 miles above the Mission, or within three miles of the mines. And this will be in ample time to secure claims, as there is a large scope of country not yet prospected. With regard to the mines, I consider them the best prospect struck since gold was discovered on the coast. The country abounds in rich placer and quartz veins. The quartz is free milling. I found many specimens which will run from \$500 to \$2000 per ton. Many nuggets are found from \$5 to \$50. A few days before I left it was reported one was found in a side gulch worth over \$100. The creeks have been prospected for about 25 miles and found rich. The placers will extend in length 50 miles, while the side gulches will probably pay well. Only about eight points along the creeks. Most of these are on disputed ground and the amount taken out is hard to get at. I saw a two-days run divided between four men, each getting eight and a half ounces for his share. There are three qualities of gold, running from \$16 to \$19 per ounce. The country is quite heavily timbered. There are about thirty houses in and about Eagle City. The stripping runs from two to fifteen feet in thickness, the gold mostly being in a slate bedrock.
