OTHER HONORS.

Mr. Post is prominent in other than political honors. He is a leading member of the Knights of Honor, having been Grand Director (executive head) of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania for three years, and the representative from his State to the Supreme Lodge of the United States for four years, and in 1880 was one of the Presidential electors from Pennsylvania. He is one of the owners and editors of the Montrose Democrat, the organ of the Democracy in his district, and has been an active campaign orator almost from boyhood up.

Mr. Post is married, and has already become one of the most popular members of Congress now in Washington. He is very unassuming, and impresses the student of human nature as a "coming man" in our national affairs.

THE YOUNGEST MEMBER OF THE FORTY-EIGHTH CONGRESS, AND THE YOUNGEST MAN EVER ELECTED TO THE NATIONAL LEGISLATURE.

A BRIEF SKETCH OF HIS CAREER.

We here present the readers of the GUARD with an excellent likeness of the youngest member of the present Congress, and the youngest man ever elected to our National Legislature.

Geo. A. Post, of Susquehanna, Pennsylvania, enjoys this distinguished honor, representing the 15th District of Pennsylvania, comprising the Counties of Bradford, Susquehanna, Wayne and Wyoming. Mr. Post is only twenty-nine years of age, of fine physical proportions, a smooth face strongly marked with more than ordinary character for one of his years, and is one of the most popular and promising young men of his State.

Mr. Post was born in Cuba, N. Y., September 1, 1854, removing at the age of seven to Oswego, in that State, where he resided until 1873, receiving his education in the Oswego Academy, and the Oswego Normal School. He then removed to Susquehanna, Pa., shortly after entering the service of the Erie Railway, in which he was soon promoted to a position of responsibility. He was elected Mayor of Susquehanna when only twenty-two years of age, which position he filled with distinguished ability.

Mr. Post, while in the railway service, and during his Mayorship, improved his evening hours by reading law, and so naturally apt was he in mastering the intricacies of Blackstone, that in a few years he was admitted to the bar. The politicians of northern Pennsylvania began to see that Mr. Post had won a standing on the tidal wave of public popularity that would elect him to Congress as a Democrat in the 15th District, which in the previous Congressional election had given a Republican majority of 4,621. Consequently he was placed in nomination by the Democrats, and elected by a plurality of 2,451 votes over the Hon. C. C. Jadin (Ind. Rep.), whose term expired with the Forty-Seventh Congress. This great victory by a young man of only twenty-nine years of age over a gentleman who had served acceptably in Congress, and who in age is many years his senior, is the greatest encomium that an appreciative constituency could bestow on the character and ability of Mr. Post.

THE LOCOMOTIVE WHISTLE.

We have given a number of statements from observers who certify to hearing the whistle for distances of over 15 miles. Here are others: Mr. J. J. Stranahan states that the whistle and the noise of the train on the tracks at Erie were formerly heard at Bousaff, Pa., a distance of 19 miles, air line.

W. J. McC., of San Pablo, Cal., writes that on calm, clear days, especially in the Fall, they hear the rattle of the cars on a trestle located 18 miles distant. J. H. S. says he has frequently heard the railway shops whistle at Grand Island, while living at Orville, a distance of 28 miles, and has seen moving trains with the unaided eye 15 miles.

Mr. C. V. Swarthout, Cape Vincent, N. Y., frequently hears the railway whistle at Kingston, Ont., 18 to 20 miles, also the rumbling of the train; also musketry firing at Fort Henry, same place, while the sound of the cannon fired there sometimes is so strong as to shake his house.

The vegetable Chinaman at Dayton, W. T., was peddling lettuce on Christmas.

The falsework of the railroad bridge at Ainsworth is completed to the third tier.

The Trout creek trail to the Coeur d'Alene mining district is now ready for tourists and others.

A broken leg for John R. Welch, of Tacoma, was the result of a runaway there on Thursday.

Pierce county, W. T., makes an apportionment of \$4 for each scholar in the public schools.

The Goldendale Gazette was ordered out Jan 1st, 1881, and since then has printed over 100,000 copies.

The storm of last week spread over the entire Northwest. At many points the damage of wind was considerable.

By spring there will be six telegraph wires between Portland and Walla Walla, and it will be almost impossible for the lines to go down.

According to the Corvallis Leader: There are about 350 persons in Oregon over 80 years of age; about 120 over 85; about 30 over 90; only 8 or 9 over 95, and perhaps three or four over 100 years of age.

In Walla Walla, a man who interferes to prevent a beast from beating a little child to death, is, by a justice of the peace, fined \$10. Won't somebody hire the justice to kick himself to death.

The Yaquina Bay railroad, says the Albany Herald, is now running 700 men and pushing things along in a business-like manner, giving encouragement to the people of Corvallis, Yaquina and intermediate points.

To show how Spokane Falls, W. T., is growing the following is the increase from May 1st to December 1st, 1883: Brick stores, 17; frame stores, 34; dwellings, 142; population May 1st, 1500; December 1st, 3000.

A number of Northern Pacific and Short Line engineers are at work near the Malheur reservation, which geographically lies in the direct route from the present finished west end of the Oregon Short Line and Corvallis, Oregon.
