

No More Land Grants.  
It is gratifying to note a practical unanimity of sentiment in Congress in relations to any more land grants. They have been the fruitful source of more evils than any other kind of subsidy given by the Government. In nearly every case they have worked the greatest injustice, and in scarcely a single instance have they answered the purposes for which the donation was made. The public domain has been despoiled for the sake of corporations which have cheated the Government and robbed the settler. The grants have uniformly escaped taxation. They have enriched organized capital at the expense of the Government and people and then refused to bear any of the burden which all other kinds of property incur. There is also, as we learn to be a change in this respect. The bill recently presented by Senator Van Wyck compels all railroads and corporations holding lands by grant from the Government to take out patents for them, whereupon they will become taxable. Even in the event of the passage of such a law it is not improbable that some device will be discovered to evade the liability, but Congress will have done its duty and show some disposition to protect the people. So far the Government has never had returned to it so much as the money expended in surveying a single land grant held by any of the corporations. Over 100,000,000 acres of land have through this medium escaped taxation, but the expenses of the survey are still due to the Government. The public will in time grow weary of this wholesale robbery and demand a different order of things.

Confignation at Jacksonville.  
About 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon fire was discovered in the New State saloon, in Jacksonville. The flames spread very rapidly and soon passed beyond the control of the fire department. There was a great scarcity of water, which embarrassed the action of the firemen, and, for a time, the whole town was threatened. At the time of the fire no wind was blowing. The roofs were also covered with snow and ice, which impeded the progress of the fire and aided the department in obtaining control. One man leaped from the second story window, in a panic, and broke an arm. Several women barely had time to escape from some of the buildings. The firemen concentrated all their efforts and finally prevented the flames from crossing the street at a critical moment and gained control. Following is a list of the losses and insurance: G. W. Savage, building and effects, \$4000, insurance, \$2000; J. N. Howard, merchant, building, \$14,000, insurance \$4500; Max Muller, merchandise, \$16,000, insurance \$6000; L. Solomon, postoffice building, \$39,000, fully insured; B. Fisher, goods, \$3,000, fully insured; Noland & Ulrich, liquors and fixtures, \$1,000, insurance, \$400; P. J. Ryan, building, no insurance; H. M. Rio, photographer, fixtures, \$250, no insurance. There are several minor losses, which will swell the total loss a few thousand dollars.

Rosecrans Indignant.  
"What are the chances for the Mexican veteran's pension bill to be passed this session?" asked a reporter of Rosecrans last night. "I don't know about its chances, but I do know about its justice. It is a shame that those men should not be cared for in their old age. There are 1082 in my district, and of the number 50 per cent. are not capable of work and forty-seven are in the poor house."

Mr. Henry Villard has resigned the Presidency of the Northern Pacific railroad forced thereto by the manipulators of Wall Street. The producer of the northwest will have abundant reasons to regret the retirement of a manager who has meant well in all his measures toward them. The stockholders of the system he represented wish larger dividends, and the producer will soon contribute to pay them. As for Mr. Villard's supposed shrewd practices, we do not believe in them, as the position he resigned is of greater consequence than the millions he may have gained by indirect methods.

Net earnings of the Oregon and California railroad for October were \$68,576. Those of the Oregon Improvement Company were \$172,451. For eleven months of 1883 the Northern \$9,179,308.

The proposition of the Secretary of the Treasury, to raise \$50,000,000 annually as a sinking fund, with which to pay the national debt, is vehemently antagonized by Senator Beck of Kentucky, who holds that we have paid \$700,000,000 already more than is required by the contract. The Senator claims that the people are entitled to relief to this amount from over-ous taxation. At the present rate of "surplus" the sinking fund would pay off the national debt in less than four-teen years.

Gov Moody has appointed Seneca Smith, Judge of the Fourth Judicial District vice Stott resigned. This appointment does not suit the slate maker, who had it fixed for County Judge Stearns to succeed to the bench. Police Judge Moreland to take Judge Stearns place, and Lem Scott to be police Judge; as Judge Smith holds only till the June election, there is still a chance to correct the matter in the near future.—Standard.

Wm. Wykull, the man who was run over by a train of cars at Palouse Junction and who was subsequently taken to St. Mary's hospital in this city, says the Walla Walla Union, will lose one of his feet if not his life, as unfavorable symptoms have set in.
