

Bills Introduced.

George of Oregon introduced the following bills in the house yesterday. A bill for the permanent improvement of the bar at the mouth of the Columbia river, \$500,000; for locks at Cascades, \$500,000; for the lower Willamette and Columbia, \$242,000; for Coos bay, \$150,000; for Yaquina bay, \$140,000; for the Coquillo river, \$60,000; for the upper Willamette and tributaries, \$31,000; for the Umpqua river, \$12,000; for the Cowlitz river, Washington territory, \$6000; for Young's river, Oregon, \$2000; for Lewis river, Washington territory, \$3000; for gauging the waters of the Columbia river and its tributaries, \$300. To allow the cities of Portland and Astoria, Or., to levy and collect tonnage taxes for the improvement of certain rivers and harbors. Also a bill in relation to certain fees allowed registers and receivers. A bill to restore to the public domains certain lands within the indemnity limits of the military wagon road from Dalles city, on the Columbia river, to Fort Boise, on the Snake river. A bill for the construction of a revenue marine steam launch for Alaskan waters. A bill to authorize the Oregon Pacific railroad to construct one or more bridges across the Willamette river in the state of Oregon, and to establish them as post roads. Also a memorial from citizens of Oregon and Washington territory asking for forfeiture of the Oregon Central railroad Co's grant, and a bill to pay Oregon Indian war claims audited by Philo Calender.—Oregonian.

Civil Service Reform.

New York Sun. The Republican majority of the Senate have stabbed the Civil Service Commission in the back.

Mr. Edmunds, Mr. Hawley, Mr. Hoar, Mr. Dawes, Mr. Anthony, Mr. Morrill and other Senators had been ardent in support of the Civil Service act and most vehement in denouncing removals from office without cause. Yet when the time came to test the sincerity of these professed principles they were shamelessly abandoned.

Caucus domination and machine rule commanded that the elective officers of the Senate against whom no charge or complaint had been made, should be abruptly dismissed. They were all turned out by the votes of the very Senators who had been loudest in their declarations for reform.

Two dissenting votes would have prevented this outrage, as the Senators had described similar acts to be. But even that insignificant number could not be found to disobey the tyranny of party discipline. Every one of the majority fell into line like regular troops, though some of them few sneaked away from the roll call by pairing off with Democrats. Voting for Civil Service reform is one thing. Voting to carry out these measures is another.

The Methodist Christian Advocate is displeased with that "species of low wit in which some indulge in prayer meetings and class meetings, at camp meetings and in revival services, which often closely borders on profanity." It says that a short time ago, at a camp meeting in Massachusetts, a man declared that his telephonic connection with the Holy Ghost was special and could not be cut off. The Baptist Examiner quite agrees with the Advocate that such language should be suppressed.

Another fearful holocaust involving a sickening loss of human life is reported by telegraph. A convent at Belleville, Illinois, was burned on the night of the 5th, and its inmates numbering twenty-seven, perished in the flames. A few terrified girls jumped from the third story windows and sustained injuries more or less severe, but the majority were blinded by the smoke and crisped by the flames almost before they had time to arise from their beds. The inquest is still in progress, and the blame for the disaster, if any, has not yet been fixed.

The Board of Directors of the N. P. Railroad has resolved upon making Tacoma the real, as it has been the nominal terminus of that road. Any criticisms that may appear in Portland papers about the new management may be imputed to that fact.

Oswinby and Elfus, who broke jail at Walla Walla some time ago were recently captured. Oswinby died a short time afterward, and Elfus is to be strangled on the 15th.

In another portion of his discourse, the speaker advised his hearers to shun religious novels, because they were generally weak and watery.
