The Nutt Case.

The acquittal of young Nutt for the killing of Dukes, his sister's betrayer and his father's murderer, in Pennsylvania, will meet the cordial approval of nearly every one familiar with the fact.

The deed was lifted out of the pale of ordinary homicides and vindicated a moral law higher than any statutory ordinance. It does not matter whether the acquittal was procured through a plea of insanity or one of justification.

The object to be reached was the freedom of the accused. Dukes had boasted of seducing Nutt's sister-- had told her father to his face that he had done so, and advised him to "send her out of town;" and when the insulted parent struck Dukes for the outrage, the old gray-haired man was shot down; and yet Dukes, after the perpetration of these crimes was turned loose upon society.

The law of Pennsylvania was not strong enough to punish a rich seducer and a wealthy murderer. Ought it to have been strong enough to punish the boy, who smarting under the outrage inflicted upon his family, took the law into his own hands and killed the wretch whom the law had failed to punish?

In doing so he may have violated the municipal law of Pennsylvania, but he vindicated a sentiment of universal humanity, and the conscience of the country will say that the deed was just. The person who is unable to perceive the distinction between a homicide committed under such circumstances and those which are the result of lawless courses and turbulent lives, is scarcely fit, mentally or otherwise, to pass upon the issues of life and death.

The law is possessed of sufficient flexibility to let the rich murderer loose, although his soul was stained with a woman's ruined honor and an old man's blood. We hold that it will not wear upon the community that it has been found sufficiently elastic for the boy who avenged these crimes to escape its meshes.
